Vote to Save Legion Trees

Woodburn—About fifty people were in attendance at the meeting held Thursday night at the city hall, called by the park board for the discussion of the possible sale of the timber on the Legion park tract in Woodburn. Harold M. Austin, chairman of the park board, presided.

A letter was read from Eugene D. Hannemann, farm forester of the state board of forestry, in which he reported that he had checked the trees and from a forestry standpoint, the trees were economically mature and ready to harvest. However, he stated, that if left "as is" will probably live some 700 years, with a number due to die in nature's thinning process, but are in better than average condition, and suggested some thinning.

An expression of opinion was given by the Woodburn fire department, the American Legion and the Junior Chamber of Commerce, all of whom recommended that the trees be saved. A vote was taken which was unanimous that the trees be saved. The park board then voted to so recommend to the city council.

There was also a discussion of ways and means for a lighted athletic field and the consensus of opinion was to develop Legion park along that line. Representatives of the school board stated they would use the field if lighted and would probably co-operate in the lighting program.

Chairman Austin suggested that the fire department, American Legion and Jaycees each appoint a representative to prepare a program to obtain lights and present it to the park board. The consensus of opinion was that the park board take charge of the matter in co-operation with the other organizations.
