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Re-elect Santiam Hospital Board

Santiam — Approximately 200 persons attended the first annual meeting of the Santiam Memorial hospital recently. All members of the board of directors were re-elected. There were 134 votes cast in the election.

Immediately following the annual meeting, the board of directors met and re-elected the present officers to serve again: Walter H. Bell, president; J. C. Kimmel, vice president; G. W. Schachtel, secretary-treasurer. President Bell reappointed all committees.

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Stayton Okehs Water Program

Stayton — The city council met in special session last week and authorized the Boatwright Engineering and Surveying company to prepare specifications for the laying of the city water mains.

Specifications will be used to advertise for bids on the actual installation of the water mains under the city's water improvement plan.

A 30x70-foot standpipe with a 400,000-gallon capacity was also so favorably approved instead of the 34x66-foot size formerly contracted for by the council.

The higher standpipe, though smaller in diameter and capacity, will provide more drop from the construction site and result in more water pressure in the mains.

The 30x76-foot standpipe was approved when it was pointed out that it would be more satisfactory for the lower construction site than the originally planned size, and at the original planned cost.

The Boatwright Engineering and Surveying company will get as its fee 5 1/4 per cent of the cost of distribution system including materials and 1 1/2 per cent of the cost of the standpipe. In both instances the fee includes supervision.

Bids will be opened for \$85,000 of water improvement bonds at the city hall Monday, Feb. 4, at 8 p.m. in conjunction with the regular city council meeting on that night.

The bonds will be retired at the rate of \$5000 per year beginning in 1953 and ending in 1969.
