

Mill City, Sublimity Eye Separate Basket Foes

Sublimity and Mill City, tied for first place in the Marion county B league, face separate opponents tonight, with Mill City drawing the tougher of the two assignments.

Mill City plays host to the Jefferson Lions, a team hard to stop by anybody when it's on one of its frequent hot streaks.

The Timberwolves are hoping Jefferson doesn't hit such a hot string tonight, for a loss would almost certainly drop Mill City into second place.

Sublimity gets an easy assignment tonight in Detroit. The basement-dwelling Detroit team hasn't won a game in nine league starts, and shouldn't give the Sublimity crew much trouble.

Third-place Gates, the only

other team in running for the Marion B title, draws the bye this time. Gates will remain in third spot regardless of the outcome of the Mill City-Jefferson and Sublimity-Detroit games.

Elsewhere in the Marion B circuit tonight, Chemawa plays at Gervais and the Oregon Deaf School at St. Paul.

All Friday night contests are slated to get underway at 8:15, with junior varsity preliminary games starting at 7 o'clock.

There are six more rounds of play following tonight's contests.

Eddie Sawyer Forgiven For N. Y. Giant Whammy

Los Angeles (U.P.)—There is no longer any mayhem in Charley Dressen's heart, but at one time he could have torn Eddie Sawyer limb from limb with an easy conscience.

Dressen, the little Brooklyn skipper who presided over the worst collapse of a pennant-contending ball club in modern history, can't forget the moment when Sawyer, the boss of the Phillies, predicted the Dodgers would win the pennant by 30 games.

"We were away out in front at the time," Dressen recalled. "And the way we were going we would have broken all kinds of records if we had kept it up, but I knew it was too good to last. Gil Hodges would have wound up with more than 60 homers, breaking Babe Ruth's record, and Duke Snider would have hit more than 50... and we'd have had three or four 20 game winners. That was when Sawyer put the whammy on us."

"Even though we did level off, it wasn't a case of us collapsing so much as it was the Giants getting hot and refusing to cool off," he said.

Dressen said his first big step to keep the Dodgers going strong all year in 1952 was to give some special instruction to their two big problem boys, Snider and Hodges, in advance of spring training at Vero Beach, Fla.

"When they tailed off on their long distance hitting it hurt us more than anything else," Dressen said. "Well, I think that a little work on fundamentals may prevent that from occurring again. One thing about Hodges, particularly, the clubs last season were using a shift on him."

Earl Torgeson Signs Contract

Boston (U.P.)—Infielder Earl Torgeson signed his 1952 contract with the Boston Braves yesterday after conferring briefly with General Manager John J. Quinn at the club's front office. His salary was not disclosed.

Torgeson, the second Braves player to sign for the coming season, ended last season with a .263 batting average for 155 games. He hit 24 homers and batted in 93 runs.

Bradley, Beavers Meet Friday and Saturday Nights

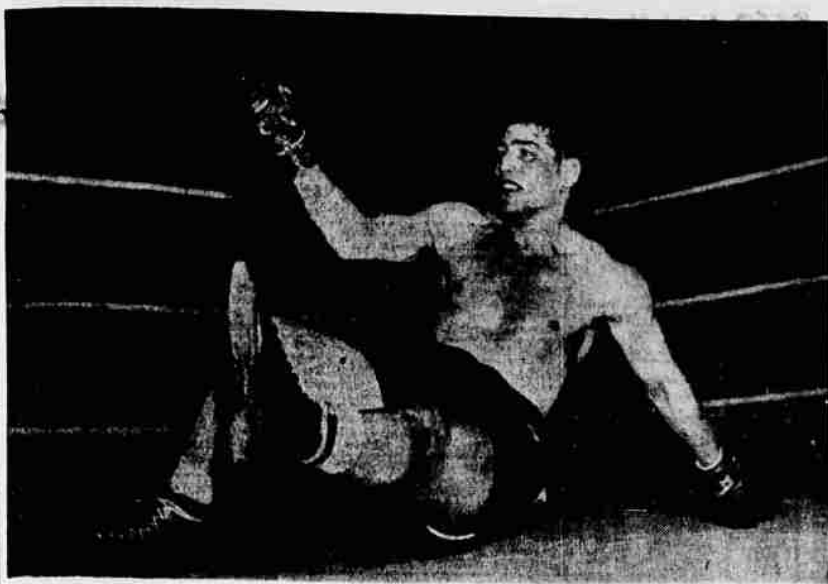

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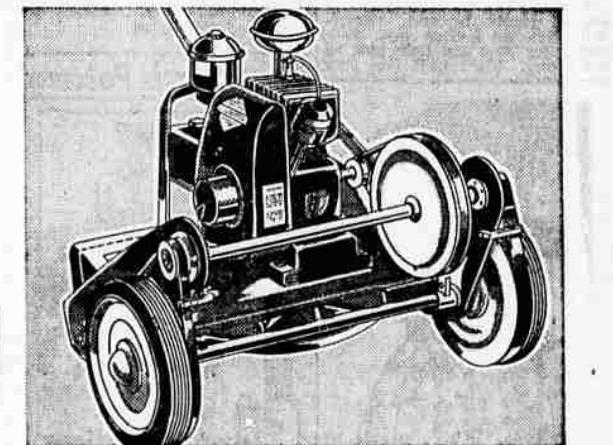
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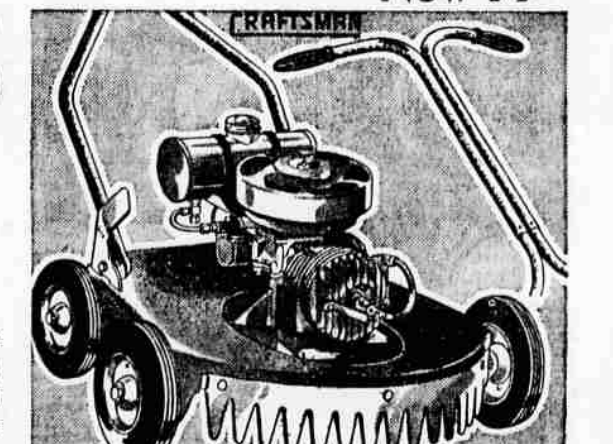
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
