Sold to the Pacific Gamble Robinson company, a Delaware corporation of which Pacific Fruit & Produce is a subsidiary, was a plot approximately 176 by 229 feet fronting on Hines street and the Southern Pacific railroad main line. Selling the property were G. H. and Caroline C. Grabenhorst.

The other plot involved was a quarter block on the northwest corner of Trade and Church streets, which was sold to the Grabenhorsts by the Pacific Gamble Robinson company. On the land bought by Pacific Gamble Robinson company that firm plans the erection of a building, the exact nature of which hasn't been made known. Zoning legislation has been passed by the Salem city council to permit building a new plant on the Hines street property.

\$35,634,474 Still Held for Refunding

Washington (AP)—Newspapers throughout the nation were credited Wednesday with helping the government refund \$2,080,668 in income taxes to 46,970 taxpayers during January. But the internal revenue bureau says it still is holding \$35,634,474 for 1,176,000 persons it has been unable to find. The announcement said a heavy rush for the refunds is expected this month.

The bureau said 461 newspapers carried lists of taxpayers the government couldn't locate to give them refunds accumulated over the years.

Trade Surplus Over \$4 Billion

Washington (AP)—The United States sold four billion dollars more in goods to foreign countries than it bought from them in 1951. And total U.S. foreign trade broke all records.

The Census Bureau sketched this booming picture for this nation Wednesday, in sharp contrast with continued trade deficits reported Tuesday by both France and Great Britain.

United States sales abroad in 1951 amounted to \$15,021,500,000—up almost 5 billion over 1950 and approaching the all time record of \$15,300,000,000 in exports set in 1947.

U.S. purchases abroad broke all records at \$10,961,600,000 in 1951, up two billion from 1950, the previous high.

And a little later, Presidential Secretary Joseph Short, told a news conference that Browdy was not authorized to quote the President.

Nor, Short added, was Rep. Sabath, D., Ill., who quoted the President Tuesday as telling him he might make the "sacrifice" and seek re-election if it would serve world peace. No Such Public Remarks
Short said many people go in to see the President and "some of them come out and do a lot of talking."

Asked whether he was saying the President hadn't made the remarks attributed to him by Browdy, Short replied: "The President has made no such public remarks as you mention. I'm sure some people in their enthusiasm confuse their own remarks with those of the President."

Asked then if he referred to Browdy and to Sabath, Short said he was talking "in general terms."

Short said he himself did not have "the vaguest idea" when the President will announce a decision.

Twelve officers of the Oregon National Guard have been selected to act as umpires for Operation Longhorn, a department of army operational exercise to be conducted at Camp Hood, Texas from February 20 to April 20.

Aid to Nationalist China to make its army an effective fighting force for invasion of southeast Asia was urged by Taft.

"The most idiotic thing to me is not utilizing Nationalist China forces" he said. "I feel we must use all of our friends in this fight against Russia. We are doing that in Europe, why not do it in China?"

When asked if invasion by Nationalist troops into southeast Asia would not precipitate World War II Taft said he did not believe so.

"Russia will hit when she is ready," he declared. "We are threatening Russia by building air bases in Britain and other European countries just as we would if Nationalist China troops were used in this fight against communism" he declared.

Truman Arranges Draft
Taft was asked if he had read President Truman's asserted statement that Truman would "submit to a draft to become a candidate." Taft answered that "a draft of a man who is president is arranged by that man himself."

"The president is still your opponent, is he not?" asked a news man.

"He certainly is," he quickly answered.

Taft sidestepped several questions on the grounds that he was not used to having a press conference before breakfast and he hadn't had time to check on the subjects dealt with in the questions.

Supreme Court Justice Walter Tooze, an ardent Taft supporter, was among the group of republicans who met the Ohio senator when he arrived here Wednesday morning on a train from Seattle.

The allies had proposed eight. Wednesday they cut it to seven. The Reds had proposed three. Tuesday they increased it to four. There was no word from the communists when they would have ready their new proposed solution for the fifth and final item of the armistice agenda. This deals with recommendations to the governments concerned for a settlement of the Korean problem.

Despite snow flurries and 17 degree cold a line of mourners six abreast and two miles long formed at noon outside the doors of nine-centuries old Westminster Hall where the dead king lay in state a second day.

Businessmen and students, workers, women and children from Scotland, Wales and Northern England, the Commonwealth and foreign countries were in the line.

It extended up the bank of the Thames to Lambeth Bridge, across the bridge and down the Albert embankment.

A middle-aged crippled woman was carried into the hall during the morning by ambulance attendants. She hobbled slowly by the catafalque with its casket, on which rested the gleaming jeweled crown of the late king.

Officers of the household cavalry in shining breastplates, red-coated gentlemen-at-arms and yeomen of the guards wearing Tudor-dated uniforms stood at rigid attention by the catafalque.
