Three-Year Old Prince Charles Will Lose Much of Childhood

London, (AP)—His name is Charles—but no one will ever call him "Charley". His hair is never rumpled, there is never a smudge on his knees, his clothes are never torn.

His pockets are clean—not like the weird and wonderful collection of odd and ends that other kids cherish.

He is only three years old but he has the gravity and quiet of a boy much older, and the manners of a youth far older again.

He bows to his elders. He shakes hands with a solemnity that tears the hearts of mothers who see him—probably including his own mother. But she is a queen and probably understands because she had little real childhood herself.

He already is: heir to the British throne; Prince of the House of Windsor; Duke of Cornwall, Duke of Rothesay, Earl of Carrick and Baron of Renfrew in the peerage of Scotland, Lord of the Hex and Great Steward of Scotland.

He already has an income from Cornwall itself of \$280,000 a year.

He will someday become Prince of Wales.

He can, if he wishes, sit in the House of Lords. His years are no barrier. At an age when he should be sitting on his mother's lap he can sit at her right hand at all solemn assemblies of state and honor.

He probably won't, but it might be one way of seeing his mother. He has seen so little of her in short life that when

New Drug for Heart Ailment

New York (AP)—A drug designed to prevent attacks of angina pectoris, a painful heart ailment, was announced Tuesday.

Fifty to 75 per cent of patients had fewer attacks or less pain when attacks did come, said three reports in the Journal of Angiology. Angiology is the science of blood vessels.

The drug, Peritrate, was developed by Chilcott Laboratories, Morris Plains, N. J., from a nitrate long used in explosives.

Angina pectoris is due to lack of blood or oxygen supply, usually from constriction of blood vessels. The new drug relaxes blood vessels.

Drs. Travis Winsor and Patrick Humphreys, University of Southern California, said the drug had beneficial effects in 78 per cent of 125 patients, and was especially useful in treating chest pains. Patients were able to step up daily activities while taking the drug.

60 Percent Cut In ACTH Prices

Philadelphia (AP)—United Research Laboratories of Philadelphia announced Monday a 60 per cent reduction in the price of ACTH, the wonder hormone drug that has been a boon to many arthritis patients.

Robert Roberts, vice president of United Research chemists have developed a new process which "makes it easier to extract this life-saving drug from the pituitary gland of hogs."

"When ACTH was first brought to the attention of the public nearly three years ago," Roberts said, "it cost \$200 a gram. Last year the price dropped to \$100 a gram and today we are able to sell it for \$40 a gram."

Roberts explained this amounts to 40 cents for one 10 milligram injection, as compared with \$1.14 previously charged.

Suspend Duties on Lead, Zinc Imports

Washington (AP)—Import duties on lead and unprocessed zinc were suspended today.

Purpose of the action is to stimulate imports to relieve domestic shortages. President Truman signed separate bills late yesterday suspending the duties.

The current import duty on scrap and reclaimed lead is 2½ cents a pound. The measures provide that the duties must be reimposed no later than March 31, 1953.

The duty would have to be reimposed earlier on either metal if the domestic price of the metal falls below 18 cents a pound for a one-month period or if the
