Road Survey Report—The cost of improving a 2½ mile section of county road 973 to a connection with the Mt. Angel-Bethany road is estimated at \$46,853 in a report of a survey made by County Surveyor A. D. Graham to the county court. Construction cannot be considered by the court until deeds for land needed in connection with a proposal to eliminate a number of curves are made available, the court states. The cost of the improvement includes same \$22,000 for an oil surface. Rebuilding of a small across Pudding river and a bridge span will be undertaken when and if the improvement is made.

Burglary Cleared—The Marion county sheriff's office believes that a series of burglaries that have been occurring at the home of Marc Saucy, 2355 Wexler road, were cleared Wednesday night with the arrest of a juvenile who was caught in the act of entering the home.

Arrested Juveniles—Sheriff deputies Wednesday night took into custody three minors and charged them with illegal possession of intoxicating beverages. They are to be cited to juvenile court.

Vets and Widows Warned—Disabled veterans and war widows were warned today that April 1 is the last day on which they may apply for a \$1500 property tax exemption provided by state law. Application is made to the county assessor in the county where the property is located.

Ask Road Improvement—A delegation of a half dozen property owners appeared before the county court Thursday asking for the improvement of a strip of county road through the Lake Labish district. The men pointed out that the district involved produces quantities of farm products and that the road, if improved would be of considerable benefit to land owners. The road in question is about a mile and a half in length. Commissioner Ed Rogers said he would recommend that the road be included in the oiling program for 1953.

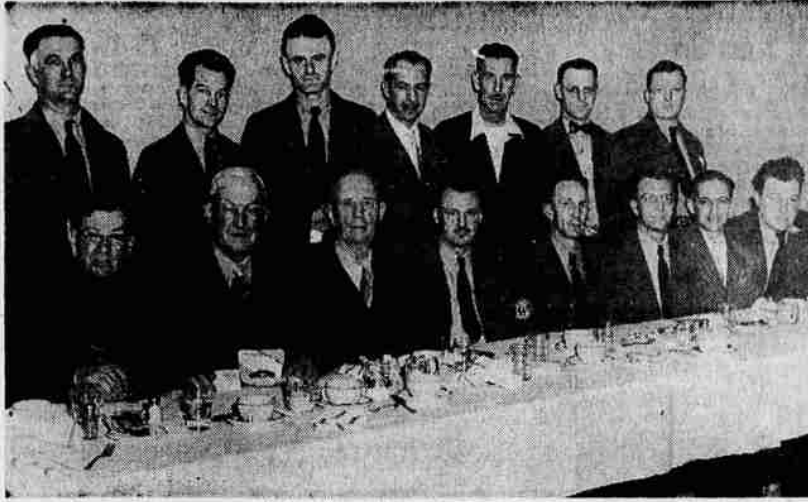

Bus Drivers Rewarded For Safety Operation

George T. Walker, white-haired veteran of Salem street transportation, was presented a costly wrist watch Wednesday night because, in the words of Mayor Al Loucks, he did the impossible.

The gift, by his employers, City Transit Lines, was for driving transit buses a full 10 years without an accident.

In achieving the distinction Walker takes his place in an honorary fraternity that has only three members among Salem drivers, men who have driven a full decade without accident and been awarded watches. The other two are Henry Eld and Homer Harrison. Other younger men are well on their way.

The three were among 17 City Transit Lines drivers who were awarded the insignia of the National Safety council for periods of safe and accidentless driving ranging from two to 14 years. The drivers and their periods of safe driving were:

J. I. Ankeny, six years; W. M. Ashcraft, 2; W. H. Burright, 3; H. V. Cross, 4; Raymond Cross, 7; Edward Dolan, 8; Henry Eld, 14; Lee Epley, 4; O. K. Hale, 7; J. H. Harp, 5; Homer Harrison, 11; Benny Miller, 3; Edward Ryan, 7; F. M. Stewart, 3; George T. Walker, 10; Ernest Winn, 3; Norman Yangle, 4. All were present except Stewart, who was ill, and Miller, who was on duty.

Eld, Harrison and Walker have all seen years of service running far back into the old trolley car days, and the buses replaced the trolleys 27 years ago. Eld, with his 14 years of service without an accident tops all drivers in both Salem and in Eugene where CTL also operates.

The insignia were presented to the men by Carl J. Wendt, general manager of the transit lines. Mayor Loucks presented the watch to George Walker.

Drive a motor vehicle one year without accident. Five or six years is certainly an achievement, but 10 years—that's just impossible. So, George, come up here and get your reward for doing the impossible."

Following the dinner in the Copper room at the Senator and before presentations, City Manager J. L. Franzen congratulated the men, and at the request of Manager Wendt, described the construction and operation of the sewage disposal plant now being completed in Salem.
