**Tuna Timbales with Creamy Pickle Sauce**

Ingredients: 3 tablespoons butter or margarine, 1/4 cup minced green pepper, 1/4 cup dry bread crumbs, 1 cup milk, 2 eggs (slightly beaten), one 7-ounce can tuna (drained), 1/2 teaspoon salt, freshly ground pepper.

Method: In a saucepan melt butter over low heat. Add green pepper and bread crumbs. Cook, stirring often, for a few minutes. Add milk, eggs, tuna, salt, and pepper; mix thoroughly. Pour mixture into 4 greased custard cups. Place in a pan of hot water in a moderate (350 degrees F.) oven 30 minutes, or until firm. To make Creamy Pickle Sauce: Make a Cream Sauce of 2 tablespoons butter or margarine, 2 tablespoons flour, and 1 cup milk. Stir in 1/2 cup chopped dill pickles, 1/2 teaspoon salt, freshly ground pepper (to taste), and 1/4 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce. Unmold timbales and serve with pickle sauce. Makes 4 servings.
