Spanish Rice with Crisp Bacon Salad Bowl Bread and Butter Surprise Dessert Beverage Surprise Dessert
Ingredients: 1 cup water, 1 package lemon-flavored gelatin, 1 cup apricot syrup (from canned apricots), 1 No. 2½ can whole unpeeled apricots, ½ cup chunk-style peanut butter, ¼ cup chopped dates, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 2 tablespoons apricot syrup.

Method: Put water in a saucepan and bring to boil; add gelatin and stir until dissolved. Stir in well 1 cup apricot syrup; chill until partially set. Meanwhile remove pits from apricots. In a small bowl, mix peanut butter, dates, lemon juice, and 2 tablespoons apricot syrup. Fill the cavity of each apricot with peanut butter mixture, pressing halves together so fruit retains its whole appearance. Put 1 filled apricot into each individual mold. Then fill molds with gelatin and chill until firm. Unmold before serving if desired. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

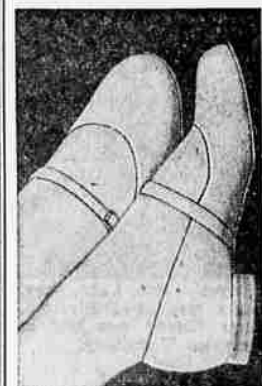
