Dusting Contract Deadline April 15

Dallas — Tuesday, April 15, is the deadline for signing contracts with the Polk county dusting cooperative, states Wesley Sherk, chairman of the board of directors.

Grower contracts have been sent to all previous members of the cooperative, Sherk stated. Any new farm operators or others interested in participating in the cooperative may secure contracts from any member of the board of directors or the county extension office in the court house at Dallas.

The dusting contract to the grower provides that application must be made by April 15 with a down payment of \$10 or 60 cents per acre, whichever is greater. Final payment is due May 15, making a total of \$2.60 per acre, the grower's advance for complete dusting services.

Shenk reminded all growers that every year a substantial refund has been made following the completion of the year's business.

Contracts may be signed with any of the following board members or the county extension office: Wesley Sherk, Willamina; Wiley Gardner, Dallas; Bill Frazer, Independence; or Wayne Allen, Salem.
