Silverton Gets School Supt.

Silverton — Members of the Silverton school board held a special meeting Tuesday and elected a superintendent of school district No. 4, making selection from scores of applicants to fill the vacancy left by resignation of Aage B. Anderson, head of the school for the past nine years.

Chosen was Howard M. Balderstone, 40, at present completing requirements at the University of Oregon for his doctor's degree in education, having been at the Eugene school for the past two years.

Mr. Balderstone is married and has a child 14 months old. The family plans to be in Silverton by the middle of June.

His preparatory work included assistant in the school of graduation in University of Oregon for two years. He served as superintendent of the Comstock, Minn., public schools and received his B. A. degree in education at State Teachers' College, St. Cloud, Minn. He was granted his master's degree in education from the University of North Dakota.

During World War II he was instructor in airplane inspection and pre-flight at the army technical school at Willow Run, Mich., writing instruction books and pamphlets for the work there. He is highly recommended by the office of the state superintendent of public instruction at Salem.

Mrs. Balderstone has a B. A. degree in education. The announcement was made by the chairman of the school board of directors, Lloyd Larsen.
