On behalf of the administration, the argument was made that "we are at war" and seizure of the mills was the only way the President could assure their continued operation.

Perlmutter Concludes
 Solicitor General Philip B. Perlman, in likening the present international situation to war, said the nation's very existence is threatened.

'Fantastic Hobgoblins'
 Scornfully, he contended that industry's claimed fears of "irreparable damage" from government operation of the mills are "a lot of fantastic hobgoblins."

John W. Davis retorted for the steel companies: "Our property is taken away, our bargaining power is by-passed." He said that was real injury.

Davis used but 10 minutes to reply to an overtime argument from Perlman. Each had been allotted two and one-half hours. Davis left 43 minutes unused.

Davis asked the justices to uphold the decision by U. S. District Judge David A. Pine that seizure of the mills was illegal.

"We look to the judiciary to hold the balance between the powers of the constitutional functionaries," he said.

After Perlman and Davis finished the main arguments, the court turned to side issues.

The first of these was a plea by Arthur Goldberg, general counsel for the CIO steelworkers, that the court hand down its decision at the earliest possible date.

After that, the court was to hear from three of the major railroad brotherhoods on what bearing its steel decision might have on the railroad seizure.

"I am often accused," he said, "of being a disturbing element in this council and I want to enter a protest now. I think the members should have had more notice of it. I didn't know it was coming up, and I feel that some of the members are being precluded from selecting men who could do good service on the budget committee. I can think of several. I think it is well to have a non-conformist or two on that committee, someone who isn't afraid to object at times, for budget-making is one of the most important things in city business. Taxes are growing so burdensome that sometimes I think the people will revolt against them."

O'Hara suggested deferring the election of budget committee members, but Alderman Robert F. White said it was time to begin getting action on the budget and that to delay another two weeks would throw the committee behind.

After O'Hara agreed to vote with the majority the council set May 21 as the date for the first budget committee meeting.

Hoffman said that Eisenhower had been the overwhelming choice of the people wherever his name had appeared on the ballot except in Nebraska where election officials ruled that unless names of candidates were spelled correctly the votes would be thrown out.

"But there will be at least 200 uninstructed delegates at the republican convention who will hold the balance of power," he said. "That is why we are so interested in the Oregon primaries where we hope to gain some more delegates."

Hoffman said that he had appeared before many groups throughout the country and he had found that his audiences had been composed of persons under 35 years of age.

Young Peoples Chance
 "I dare say there are several million young people in the United States, now independent voters, who wish to join the republican party if the right candidate is nominated," Hoffman said. "I also believe that this is the year that the republican party with Eisenhower can be revitalized with young people of enthusiasm and high idealism."

Hoffman expressed belief that the Soviet government is not ready for war at this time because intervention of the United Nations into Korea, together with the success of the Marshall plan of aid to free European countries have upset the Kremlin's time table.

He said that while Korea has been a disappointment to us it has been a disaster to Red China, as well as very discouraging to the Russian Kremlin.

Hoffman spoke later Tuesday before students of the University of Oregon, after which he was to go to Portland and then fly east.

to these and other free nations upset their plans and now I feel sure that they are in no position to wage war but will be content to integrate into every free nation and overcome them by propaganda instead of by military might."

He added, however, that he felt Russia was still a serious threat to the free world, and that America could not desert the people of the free nations but must continue to aid them in order to get them back on their feet for our own defense.

He said that Gen. Eisenhower had done a tremendous job in welding the military forces of 14 nations into one European army, a task that took the highest kind of diplomacy and able administrative ability.

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
