Dean Smith is suing Margaret Smith, whom he married at Vancouver, Wash., Nov. 30, 1950. He also asks custody of a child. Robert Kenady has filed against Letha Kenady, whom he married at Springfield, Dec. 25, 1951. Marilyn Hayes asks a divorce from Donald Hayes, to whom she was married at Lebanon May 6, 1945. She asks custody of two children.

Disappointed Dance Student Sues Tutors

Portland (AP)—Mrs. Erma E. Commons, Albany, Ore., filed suit in circuit court here Monday asking \$10,000 punitive damages from the Arthur Murray School of Dancing and its Portland operators. Mrs. Commons charged in her complaint that the firm represented falsely it could improve her personality and better her ability to obtain a position, as well as teach her to dance. She said the dance school induced her to pay \$628 last November and to sign an agreement to pay an additional \$600 for a course in dancing. She asked that the \$628 be returned to her, the agreement to pay \$600 be declared invalid and that she be awarded \$10,000 as punitive damages.

Brazil Rescuers Restore Peace

Belem, Brazil (AP)—Col. Sival Castro, chief of staff of the Brazilian First Air Zone, announced Tuesday that peace has been established among two bickering rescue expeditions at the scene of last month's crash of a Pan American Stratocruiser. He said the situation was being solved with construction of a landing strip for small planes to evacuate all members of an unofficial expedition sponsored by a Sao Paulo state politician. Three planeloads of paratroopers sent by the Brazilian Air Force to rescue a Brazilian official and an American, members of the official expedition who had been taken to Rio De Janeiro from an advance base, Col. Castro said.

Election Forces Cut In Portland Budget

Portland (AP)—The Portland City Council began cutting its budget Tuesday, because the voters Friday defeated a proposed 2½-mill levy. The council will have about \$400,000 to meet automatic salary increases and the cost of cutting firemen's hours to 56 a week. But at least \$1,600,000 in requests will be turned down.

Lost Couple in Mud Up to Necks

Orange, Tex. (AP)—A Vinton, La., couple lost in a Sabine river swamp north of Orange since Sunday afternoon were found alive Tuesday in mud up to their armpits. They are Mr. and Mrs. M. B. Jonnie Johnson, both about 35. They were reported in serious condition from exposure. More than 200 persons, equipped with boats, an airplane and

short wave radio had searched for the couple. The Orange sheriff's office said that A. Block of Port Arthur, Tex., who owns a fishing camp in the area where the couple disappeared, located the two. They were carried in a Louisiana highway police car to a hospital in Lake Charles, La., where attendants said their condition was "fair."

Record New York Budget

New York (AP)—The city council adopted a 1952-53 expense budget Tuesday of \$1,469,265,101, the largest in the city's history.

Should Doctor Tell Patient Illness Cancer

Cleveland (AP)—Should a doctor tell a patient he has cancer, if the physician is asked the question? Dr. John W. Cline of San Francisco, president of the American Medical Association, says yes. At the annual meeting of the Ohio State Medical Association Tuesday night, Dr. Cline was questioned on whether the physician should always tell the patient the truth. "If the patient puts you on the spot," he answered, "you have no right to lie to him, even if he asks you 'do I have cancer?'" In his address, Dr. Cline discussed a recent survey on the feelings of the public toward doctors. One complaint was that physicians are not sufficiently frank with patients on their illnesses. San Diego (AP)—A navy plane which crashed into the sea about 10 miles north of here Monday was piloted by Ens. Leslie G. Monroe, 22, of Medford, Ore.

Pacific Fleet Air Headquarters, in announcing his identification, said he was missing and presumed dead. Monroe, son of Mr. and Mrs. Levi G. Monroe of Medford, was on a routine training flight from nearby Miramar Air Station in the F4U Corsair fighter. The crew of the fishing boat R-Zee saw the plane crash but found only an oil slick on the surface.
