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Presbyterians Foregathering

Albany — Advance commissioned delegates to the general assembly of the United Presbyterian church of North America began arriving in Albany Wednesday, with housing facilities being provided for 250 commissioners or delegates and an additional 250 visitors who are expected from a distance to attend the assembly, it was reported Wednesday at assembly headquarters at the United Presbyterian church by Dr. John E. Simpson, minister of the First United Presbyterian church of Oak Park, Ill.

Dr. Simpson, former moderator, who has just returned from three months in Egypt and the Sudan, said everything was in readiness for the 94th general assembly of this world-wide denomination. Pre-assembly groups were meeting Wednesday.

Dr. Simpson is in charge of public relations, and stated that one of the highlights of the sessions after the assembly convenes Thursday evening will be the election of officers after the opening Thursday evening.

The assembly will be held from May 29 through June 5. Up for report and discussion will be a proposal for merger of the three Presbyterian denominations, namely the Presbyterian church of the U.S.A., Presbyterian in the United States of the United Presbyterian church of North America.

The merger would involve more than four million members, Dr. Simpson said. The merger report will be given by Dr. R. W. Gibson, president-elect of Monmouth College, Monmouth, Ill., which is a United Presbyterian college.

After the preassembly meeting Wednesday night, with the Rev. Leonard Odiorne, pastor of the Westminster Presbyterian church of Portland, speaking, the Thursday morning conference will be made of business and group meetings, preparation to opening Thursday evening.

Many commissioned delegates attending the assembly feel that Albany is a fitting place to hold the general assembly, as it was here that the Associate Presbyterian and Associate Reformed Presbyterian church of Oregon united their presbyteries to become known as the United Presbyterian church.

During the assembly the Albany church will celebrate the centennial of its founding.
