Fix Water Days For Woodburn

Woodburn—Alternate use of water from the Woodburn water works for lawn and garden sprinkling and irrigation between the east and west sections of the city will go into effect for the summer Sunday, June 1. The regulation based on a city ordinance will be in effect until the end of the summer.

Residents of the area east of the Southern Pacific railroad tracks may use water for irrigation on the odd numbered days of the week. Those on the west side of the tracks may use water for irrigation on the even numbered days of the week. The regulation covers all users both inside and outside of the city. A fine of from \$5 to \$25 is provided for violation of the ordinance.

Purpose of the alternate irrigation ordinance is to conserve water during the summer period. The heavy use of water during the summer reduces the reserve in the lower below the safe point for adequate fire protection on many evenings. The new well being installed in the city will not be in use in time to materially help the supply this summer.

Silverton School Election Candidates
