Carmela Burch received a scholarship to Oregon State college and the Reader's Digest award of a year's subscription for being valedictorian. Frank Archambeau, salutatorian, received a science scholarship to Reed college and also an award from the Oregon section of the American Chemical society as the outstanding student in chemistry.

This is the third consecutive year that students from Union high school, Stayton, have received science scholarships. Teacher in this department is Bertha McDaniels, a graduate of Reed college.

Both Carmela Burch and Frank Archambeau received books from the Durforth Foundation. A special award in sportsmanship was made to Harold Titus.

He will be the first person to have his name engraved on a permanent plaque presented by Lloyd Girod. Girod also presented him with a check for \$25. Two permanent trophies for the athlete with the best batting average and for the greatest number of points in track went to Darwin Fehlen. At the same time he was presented with the two similar trophies won in his junior year but held back until his graduation because of athletic association rules.

Arnold commended the teachers for their work during his five year term as superintendent.
