

Keep Oregon Green List Of Winners Announced

Prize winners have been announced in the Keep Oregon Green fire prevention contest. Jimmy Rawlings, 810 Ralcliff drive, Salem, and Nancy Payne, 1335 Mission street, both students at Leslie junior high school, are first prize winners in the junior and senior divisions respectively and will receive their awards at the 4-H summer school assembly June 23 at Corvallis. Dean Paul M. Dunn of the school of forestry at Oregon State college, and president of the Keep Oregon Green association, will present the awards.

2 Institutions Need Personnel

State civil service officials said Friday that personnel is needed to maintain the staffs at two state institutions. At Oregon State hospital are immediate vacancies for male hospital aides. This work involves non-professional nursing duties and the beginning pay is \$193 dollars a month. There are also openings at the hospital for graduate nurses. These positions involve supervising ward activities in the hospital's new tuberculosis unit. The starting pay is \$239 a month with an additional \$11 differential for communicable disease duty. At Oregon State penitentiary are openings for both male and female correctional officers. Women's correctional officer positions have a starting pay of \$219 a month. Applicants should have related college work or experience. Positions for men have starting salaries of \$250 a month.

There is also an immediate opening at the penitentiary for a women's correctional sergeant. An applicant for this position should have had at least three years' of experience in institutional work or comparable college experience.

Floyd J. Cook Rites Monday

Funeral services for Floyd J. Cook, 69, long active in Oregon politics, will be held in Portland Monday.

Cook died following a heart attack while sitting in the University club in Portland, where he resided, Thursday night.

Cook was a native of Portland and in recent years he was engaged in the insurance and investment business. In 1910 he was married to Helen Colvig and was in the insurance business a number of years in a southern Oregon city.

He was a delegate to the republican national convention in 1928 and 1932, was a presidential elector in 1936 and was chairman of the republican state central committee from 1930 to 1932. In 1940 he was an unsuccessful candidate for the republican nomination for state treasurer.

Cook served as a captain in World War I and was active in the organization of the American Legion.

Cook's father, Vincent Cook, was prominently identified with the early industrial growth of Portland and established the first salmon cannery in Oregon.

For a number of years he made his home at the University club in Portland. He was well known in political circles in Salem, and frequently visited the capitol city.

Host Dies at End Of Gay Party

Oregon Not Foreign Country Norblad Advises Easterner

There are some folks back in the New England states who still think that Oregon is in foreign territory. But Congressman Walter Norblad is doing his utmost to convince these people that not only does the American flag wave over the vast state but Oregon has enjoyed statehood night on to 100 years.

It is a known fact that some people in the far east still think Indians roam the lands in the west along with herds of buffalo, but Norblad was perturbed when he received a postal card from Jeffrey Rubin of Dorchester, Mass., addressed to the "Oregon Embassy, Washington, D. C."

"I wish to assure you that Oregon is one of the great states of the forty-eight in the United States of America, and as it is not a foreign country it does not, of course, have an embassy here in Washington, D. C., or anywhere else," Norblad informed Rubin.

"While my state of Oregon was, of course, not settled as early as your state of Massachusetts, I do wish to advise that we have been a state for almost a hundred years, having been admitted to the union in 1859. My own home town of Astoria was settled in 1811 and there has been a community or city there ever since that time."

Norblad sent Rubin some booklets on Oregon and urged him to take a trip west and see the state for himself.

Family Quarrel Ends in Death

Portland (P)—A family argument ended early Saturday in the fatal shooting of Roy Baker, 26, of Portland.

His stepfather, Melvin Evans, 51, was arrested and booked on a murder charge. Detective Sgt. Dan Mitola said Evans' wife, Elmeater, 45, mother of Baker, and her cousin Mrs. Stella Jackson, 44, Klamath Falls, were held as material witnesses.

The shooting occurred in the Evans apartment in Northeast Portland. Mitola said he was told Baker knocked Mrs. Evans down twice before the shooting with a 30-30 rifle.

All are Negroes.

Jury Returns Damage Verdict

A verdict of \$28,816, covering general and special damages, said to be one of the largest returned in a Marion county court, was awarded Friday by a jury in the case of Earl Comer against Archie Lewis, 23-year-old service station attendant of Newberg.

The case, heard before Circuit Judge George R. Duncan, was one of the last official acts to be held in the old court house. Judge Duncan's court will be moved to the new location in the school office building next week.

Comer, a one-time employee of the Oregon Pulp and Paper company, a pedestrian on Lancaster road near the Macleay junction, was struck at dusk by Lewis' car Aug. 4, 1951. He was badly injured and has not been able to work since.

Comer was represented by Bruce Williams and Otto R. Skopil.
