Portland Snaps Seattle Win Streak at 11 Games

Yanks in First Place—Right Where Stengel Said

(By The Associated Press) Casey (The Prophet) Stengel leads his New York Yankees west Friday in first place, just like he said he would.

Stopping off in Boston on the way home from his first western swing, Stengel said:

"If we can win anywhere, it's at home. We should be able to go up and grab the lead sometime in the next two weeks."

Stengel wasn't kidding. Once the Yanks got home

they proceeded to blast away at a 12-of-15 pace, winning 10 of 11 from the western teams. Both the Yanks and Red Sox caught Cleveland, and passed them.

Young Tom Morgan popped up with a fine three-hit shut-out in Thursday's Yankee Stadium finale, 3-0, over last place Detroit.

Detroit went home with a seven-game losing string to show for their eastern trip and nine-man deal with Boston.

Sid Hudson, acquired from Washington Tuesday, kept the Boston Red Sox in step with the Yanks, only 13 percentage points out of first place. Hudson needed relief help from young Ivan Delock in the ninth to subdue the enraged St. Louis Browns, 7-5.

The seething Browns played the game under protest because Player-Manager Marty Marion had been suspended indefinitely after Wednesday's argument with Umpire Bill McGowan.

Cleveland also clung on the Yanks' heels, only a half game back, by beating Washington, 7-4, for Bobby Feller's sixth win.

Chicago climbed past Washington into fourth place, only four games out, with a 10-4 verdict over Philadelphia. Chico Carrasquel's two triplets and Sherm Lollar's two-run homer led the Sox' 14-hit attack.

In the National, St. Louis continued to mess up the league-leading Brooklyn Dodgers, 15-10, to make it three out of four for the series.

The loss cut the Brooks' lead over idle New York to 3½ games. The Giants' game at Cincinnati was rained out.

Chicago continued to scoot in pursuit with a 3-1 victory over the Phillies for the Cubs' 15th win in their last 19 games.

Low Burdette pitched one-hit ball for eight relief innings after replacing Ernie Johnson with two runs in and nobody out in the second as Boston whipped Pittsburgh, 11-2.

(By The Associated Press) Portland snapped Seattle's Pacific Coast League winning streak at 11 Thursday night.

The Rainiers bowed to the Beavers 2-1 and evened the series in Portland at a game apiece.

Seattle could collect only six hits off Fred Sanford, three of them coming in the eighth inning when the Rainiers scored their only run. The Beavers picked up seven—including Joe Brovia's second inning home run—off Art Del Duca and Earl Johnson. Portland added the run needed to win in the fifth.

Hollywood grabbed a 2 to 1 victory over San Francisco, capitalized on a walk, a sacrifice, and error and a force play to put over the winning tally in the seventh inning.

It was the tenth straight loss for the Seals, who skidded down into seventh place.

Another winning streak was snapped in Los Angeles, the Angels whipping Oakland, 5 to 0, after the A's had captured seven straight.

San Diego and Sacramento tallied 15 innings before the Sad Sacs won out, 6-5. The setback cut the Padres' loop lead to one game.

The hapless San Francisco club, desperate for talent, reached into its Yakima farm outfit Thursday to appropriate for its own use the only two players

batting over .300—Bill Anderson, who will take over the first base spot, and Gene Klingler, who will replace Bill McCawley in center field.

Yakima is in last place in the Western International League standing and the Seals are only one game out of the Coast League basement.

College Booster Clubs To Be Studied by PCC

Portland (AP)—College booster clubs will come under scrutiny of the Pacific Coast Conference in the coming year.

A conference spokesman said the clubs—which annually contribute thousands of dollars to help athletes in school—would be asked to open their records to examination.

Colleges also will be asked to report on all direct and indirect aid contributed by the clubs.

If any club does not co-operate, the college will be told to divorce itself from all activities of the club and its members, said the spokesman, H. P. (Dick) Everest, acting president of the University of Washington.

All this is part of the conference's attempt to run professionalization of college sports.

In a previous session of the annual conference meeting here, officials also directed Conference Commissioner Victor Schmidt to hire as many investigators as he needs to run down all rumors of illegal recruiting or subsidization.

The spokesman, who announced these matters after closed sessions of conference officials, also said the conference was disciplining its own transgressors.

He refused to say who or what these were, adding that a year ago, when the conference quit fining erring schools, the decision was made to keep all such matters secret.

Everest said only that three schools at a request made by the conference a year ago, had punished coaching staff members for violations of the conference code.

Spokane (AP)—The Spokane Indians Wednesday signed Pitcher Jack Spring, the second Washington State college freshman star to enter the professional baseball ranks this week.

Spring, 19-year-old lefthander who uncoils a good curve and a hopping fast ball, joins Ed Bouchee, a first baseman signed by the tribe Tuesday. Both were standouts on the WSO varsity this season.

The Indians sold First Baseman Herb Simpson, a .281 hitter, to make room for Spring. Simpson goes to Albuquerque of the class C Southwest International league. He was the last of five Negro players who started the season with Spokane. The other four were released or sold earlier.

Spring, a good basketball prospect at WSC, and Bouchee are both Spokane high school products.

Whatever happened to the plans to have the champion of the Western International league play a post-season "little world series" with the champion of the Western league? . . . the proposal was talked quite strongly by directors of the WIL immediately prior to the 1952 campaign . . . since then, the matter has apparently been forgotten . . .

Would Outdraw Intra-Loop Playoffs

If it weren't for the cold weather which sets in throughout the area of the Western International and most of the Western league in the middle of September, the inter-league playoffs should be quite a drawing card . . . they would certainly outdraw any form of playoff between teams within the Western International league . . . and within the Western league.

Would Involve Only First-Place Clubs

Suppose Salem won the Western International league pennant (wishful writing, perhaps, but for the sake of the example, suppose the Solons did it) . . . wouldn't you rather pay to see them play against the champion of the class A Western league than you would to see them play a post-season series with other first-division WIL clubs? . . . of course an inter-league playoff between pennant winners would mean that the second, third and fourth place finishers in each league would be left out of the playoffs altogether . . . but judging from the way Shaughnessy playoffs have been drawing in recent years, it would be no crime to omit them . . . as a matter of fact, the Shaughnessy playoffs were cancelled near the end of the 1951 WIL season, after league directors earlier that year had voted to conduct them.

Denver Ought to Pack 'Em In

From all appearances, it looks as if Denver will win the Western league pennant . . . Denver is the prize minor league city in the United States, from an attendance standpoint . . . last year Denver drew nearly 500,000 fans . . . and this year's attendance figures are keeping ahead of the week-by-week figures of last year . . . with a break in the weather, Denver's ball park would be filled every night for a playoff with the Western International league champ . . . the suggested series would be a four-games-out-of-seven affair, with two or three games at one city, then moving to the other city to complete the set.

Works Well in East

A similar plan works very well each year between the pennant winners of the International and the American Association leagues . . . it might work well here, too . . . it ought to be worth a try, anyhow.
