

Leads Assigned in Annual Ashland Shakespeare Show

Ashland — Top roles in the Oregon Shakespearean festival for 1952 were almost evenly divided between newcomers to the event and old hands, as rehearsals for the coming season opened in Ashland this week.

Almost all the actors in the company of 60 appear in several roles in the four plays which run in rotation from August 1 through August 30 in Ashland.

In "Julius Caesar," four players well known to festival audiences will play top roles. Bill Oyler, Stanford university, will be seen as Brutus; Bill Ball, Carnegie Tech, Mark Antony; Paul Kliss, Buhl, Idaho, Caesar; and Phillip Hanson, University of Illinois, Cassius.

The lead in the chronicle play, "Henry V," went to a newcomer, Richard Rizzo of San Jose State. Others prominent in that play include Dion and Virginia Chesse of San Francisco, who play Fluellen and Katherine respectively. John Bettencourt of Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, who plays Harfleur. All are newcomers.

In "Much Ado About Nothing," Richard Graham of New York, veteran festival actor and director, plays Benedick; Eleanor Prosser, a newcomer from San Marino, Calif., plays Beatrice; Pat Hines, Corpus Christi, Texas, and here for the first time plays Leonado, and Phillip Hanson plays Dogberry.

Paul Kliss will be seen as Prospero in "Tempest"; Douglas Meeker, Washington State speech instructor from Portland, plays Caliban; Bill Ball plays Ariel, and Tom Brennen, Cleveland, Ohio, plays Trinculo. Meeker and Brennen are new here.

The producing director, Angus Bowmer, and all three play directors—Graham, Hanson and Allen Fletcher of Yale university are festival veterans.

Eighteen states and one foreign country are represented in the company.

Scientists Use Novel Methods In Dealing With Cancer

Corvallis (P)—A scientist has grafted together as many as 80 little animals into a single living mass in an attempt to learn how organisms meet the problem of overgrowth. The result eventually may help to solve the cancer problem.

The animals are microscopic one-celled creatures called stentors.

Dr. Vance Tartar, Nahcotta, Wash., biologist, hooked dozens of these little animals together in an attempt to make a multicelled creature. He sought to find out whether it could organize many mouths and other parts into one orderly system.

Dr. Tartar reported the initial results of the experiment before the American Association for the Advancement of Science here.

It made some feeble attempts to take care of itself as an individual but failed to develop any system to control its excess
