Detroit Home Sites Charted

Detroit—Tentative plans have been drawn for the recreational use of national forest land adjacent to the Detroit reservoir. Plans for the area consist of three forest camps, two resort areas, six organization areas, in addition to an extensive area which will be available for summer home sites.

The area planned for summer home developments extends on the Blowout access road along the south side of the reservoir. None of these lots will be directly on the lake shore.

Priority for lake shore space is in order of the largest public use, so that in planning the area, location of forest camps and picnic areas serving the greatest number of people will be in the most desirable areas.

Resorts serving the public receive second priority, followed by organizations having unrestricted membership such as the YWCA, YMCA, Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts. Last on the priority list are the summer home site for private use. These restrictions apply only to national forest recreation areas.

Applications are now being accepted at the Detroit ranger station for summer home lots, but it will be some time before necessary surveying and road development can be made. Since money has not yet been appropriated for this purpose the date of developments is definite. No lots will be leased until preparations can be completed.

Lebanon Approves School Expenditures

Lebanon — Voters re-elected William Thomas to the board of directors of Lebanon's school district 16, approved the 1952-53 school budget and voted a five-mill serial levy for the five years to finance school improvements.

The budget passed at the annual school meeting by a 60 to 15 margin, approved the expenditure of \$54,794.55 over the 6 per cent limitation.

The special levy, which had been recommended by a lay citizens' committee after studying the school situation, passed by a vote of 58 to 15.

Thomas, the only candidate on the ballot, received 62 votes.

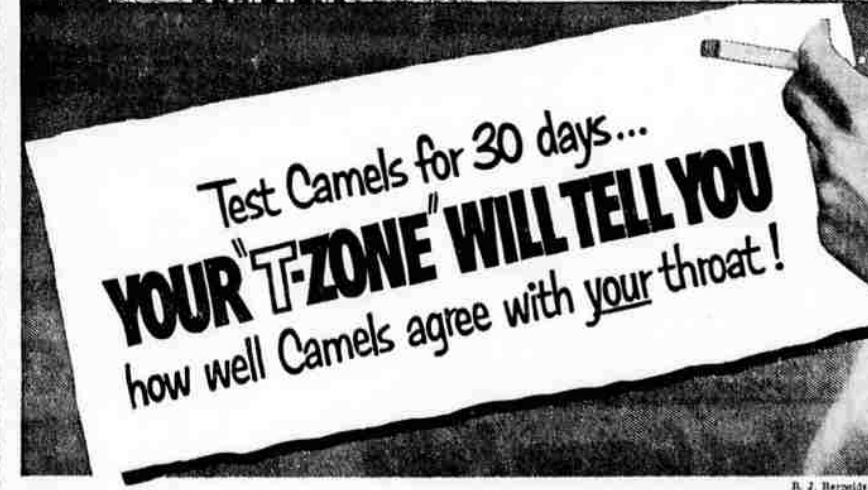
