July 4 Parade At McMinnville

McMinnville — A giant parade, the biggest fireworks display in Oregon, two horse shows, a cowboy breakfast and a play-day for western riders will make up the agenda for the Fourth of July celebration in McMinnville.

First event on the two-day schedule is the parade at 10:30 a.m. on July 3. Already entries in the parade have been received from the Salem Cherrians and the Newberg Berrians, both marching units. Entry from the greatest distance away, as yet, is the Portland police drum and bugle corps.

An entry also is being planned by the Sheridan Chamber of Commerce. One of the visiting bands will be the Newberg high school group, and local floats that were entered totaled 32 shortly after entry blanks were being sent in to parade officials.

Ringmaster at the Thursday evening and Friday afternoon horse shows will be Dr. William B. Anderson, Portland. Bert Corby, Portland, has been obtained to assist in the production of the show and will aid the judges in scoring the jumping events.

One of the outstanding entries in the horse show will be The Talisman, from Campbell's Palomino, ranch, Eugene. The Talisman is a champion palomino parade horse and was reserve champion at the Cow Palace, 1949, in a class of 49 top parade horses, was high point parade horse in 1950 at the All Palomino Horse show, and is the winner of more than 50 ribbons and 25 trophies.

The horse show will include jumpers, three and five-gaited horses, Tennessee walkers, fine harness and roadsters to bike. Western events will include flag races, children's and cowgirl's races, a pony express race, stock horse race and parade class horses. The half-mile derby, a feature of both show programs, is expected to draw thoroughbred races horses from many sections of the northwest. A \$150 purse will be offered.

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Phone Mergers Advocated

Spokane (AP)—An Oregon telephone commission official said Monday the only solution to financial problems plaguing small, independently-owned telephone companies is a merger with other companies of similar size.

Speaking at a banquet of the Washington and Oregon Independent Telephone Association convention here was Joseph L. Kennedy, chief accountant for the Oregon Public Utilities Commission.

"Small company must have enough revenue to meet costs. Very often, the operating cost of two companies combined is very little more than for each operated separately. But merged, they have twice the revenue," Kennedy pointed out.

G. E. Krieger, Everett, president of the Washington Independent Telephone Association, presided at the afternoon session.

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Seed Outlook Reported Good

Stayton — According to M. J. Martin, manager of the Stayton Farmers co-op, there will be one of the largest grass seed crops on record this year.

The 6,000 acres of chewing fescue and 7,000 acres of alfalfa look especially good, he says. Both are lawn seed grasses, alfalfa being used, also, for pasture grass. Only a sudden hot period could ruin the prospects for producers of these grass seeds.

Though it is too early to predict much, Martin says, the highland bent crop looks just fair. There are about 10,000 acres of this in production in this area, 80 to 90 per cent of the total U.S. production of this variety which is a fine-grade lawn seed.
