

53,500 Bonus Checks Have Gone Into Mail

The bonus division of the state department of veterans affairs said Saturday that 53,500 bonus checks had gone into the mails by the end of the week.

This represents payments to 2089 next of kin of deceased Oregon veterans and 51,411 to living exservicemen since June 18, the day the first bonus checks went into the mails. The current rate of payment is about 1700 a day.

Oregon voted a bonus to its veterans of World War II of

\$10 a month for domestic service or \$15 a month for foreign service to a maximum in either case of \$600. The average payment is expected to be about \$415.

Hub Saalfeld, head of the bonus division, said veterans with bonus applications lower than 60,000 who will not have been paid by Monday can assume that their claims are in the pending file. There are about 3000 of these. The veterans were urged not to inquire presently about the status of their claims, as this merely slows down the work of the bonus division.

Saalfeld said the bonus division is doing all it can to clear up this backlog. As each of these "irregular" claims is cleared up, approved and audited, authority to make payment then goes to the secretary of state's office for preparation of the check, along with all the regular authorizations going to that office the same day.

A backlog of about 20,000 claims approved by the bonus division awaits preparation of checks. The secretary of state's office can write these at a rate of about 7500 a week. Each check must go through a protective graph. So it is, that a claim approved by the bonus division for payment will take about three weeks to go to the postoffice in the form of a check to the veteran.

Veterans with higher claims numbers—those ranging from 60,000 to 80,000—were asked not to inquire about their cases until the middle of August, if they have not been paid by then.

De Shazer Story Told on Screen

"De Shazer," the full length, sound-color film depicting the life of Sgt. Jacob De Shazer of Salem, the Doolittle raider, who turned missionary to his Japanese captives, will be shown at 3 p.m. Sunday at the public auditorium, Portland, under auspices of Seattle Pacific college.

The picture is adapted from the book by Dr. C. Hoyt Watson, president of Seattle Pacific. It tells how eight American fliers, with Gen. Jimmy Doolittle in command, were forced down behind Japanese lines in China April 18, 1942, and taken by the Japanese military. While under sentence of death, De Shazer received a Bible, which led to his determination to return to Japan "with a Bible instead of bombs" should he be delivered.

De Shazer, at the close of World War II, studied at the school of missions at Seattle Pacific college, obtaining a B. A. degree, and returned to the Orient with his wife as a missionary.

The film, produced by Great Commission Films, Hollywood, was endorsed by the Doolittle raiders at their tenth anniversary meeting recently.

Truman Certain to Make Most Of House Action on Controls

Washington (AP) — In the summer of 1950, just after the battle for Korea started, Bernard Baruch came to Washington and warned congress there'd be bad inflation unless it slapped on price and wage controls.

President Truman wasn't impressed. But congress was and voted Truman price-wage control power before the summer was over.

The 1950 elections were coming up in November. Truman didn't set up the price machinery until after the elections.

But it takes time to get machinery like that in motion. It was early in 1951 before the government was able to put a lid on prices and wages. And by that time living costs had begun to climb.

In the 18 months since controls went on, living costs have risen 4.1 per cent. They reached a peak last January, dipped a bit, and in May surged up again, almost equal to the January mark.

The republicans have dumped the blame at Truman's door, for his tardiness in starting controls in 1950.

But those controls will end June 30, unless congress votes to continue them. Now the Truman administration, a few months before the 1952 elections, wants them continued.

The senate listened and voted to keep them eight months to a year longer. But the house voted Thursday — it was a combination of republicans and southern democrats who did it

Esslingen, Germany—American Red Cross European headquarters reports that Airman 1st Class Raymond Culley of 117 Brown street, Silverton, Ore., has been awarded the Standard First Aid certificate upon completion of an army-sponsored course in accident prevention and first aid.

Educational safety courses for service personnel were set up by the Red Cross in response to requests from military authorities as a means of helping to reduce accidents in Europe which they estimate are costing American taxpayers more than a half-million dollars monthly.

A/3C Culley, who is with the supply squadron at Brize Norton, England, was chosen for the safety school by his commanding officer. He was given instruction in both the prevention of accidents and the proper first aid care of accident victims.

The Red Cross safety program has met with widespread approval by army and air force authorities in Germany, England and Austria.

Washington (AP) — Rep. Ellsworth R. Ore., said Saturday he is hopeful that an informal conference may be held in Portland next month to discuss legislation affecting the state's Oregon and California grant lands.

Dean Emeritus Of U of W Dies

Seattle (AP) — University of Washington Dean Emeritus Herbert T. Condon, adviser to the board of regents and an official with 49 years of service to the University of Washington, died shortly after midnight Friday. He was 82.

He had suffered from a long illness which, for the first time in many years, prevented him from taking his usual traditional place at the head of the June commencement procession.

He became dean of men at the university in 1930 and had served under nine presidents. Previously he was at Oregon Agricultural college, now Oregon State college, and at the University of Idaho.

He told a reporter he is trying to arrange the conferences between members of the House interior committee, scheduled to be in the state, and various officials of the O & C counties.

The committee members plan to be in Portland July 17, 18 and 19 while taking part in a Bureau of Land Management field trip. It still is not known just what congressmen will attend the sessions.

Ellsworth said he felt an on-the-ground discussion of O & C problems would be of benefit to the committee in view of the complex history of the land grant and its return to the government.

Chances of a Strong Third Party Slumps Close to Zero

Washington (AP) — On the eve of the month of the national nominating conventions, the chance of a significant third party movement anywhere has slumped close to zero.

Powerful democratic party leaders are hopeful of an adjustment on civil rights policy which will persuade unhappy southerners to stay put this year. The only possibility of a third party bolt, however, is in the Democratic party. Either an all-out civil rights platform plank or the draft nomination of President Truman could set it off.

Sen. Richard B. Russell of Georgia has said he will not bolt. But some others are muttering, including Mississippi's Gov. Hugh White. Russell was the south's stop-Truman favorite son. His boom began to deflate when the president said in March he would not run again. No serious thought will be given to drafting Mr. Truman unless Gov. Adlai Stevenson of Illinois balks at heading the democratic ticket. A Truman draft could come.

Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower is on record that he will not

bolt if Sen. Robert A. Taft is nominated next month by the republicans. There might be a sit-down among Eisenhower's most enthusiastic supporters if Taft headed the party ticket, but no bolt.

Taft is a regular and long since said he would support Eisenhower if the general were nominated. That goes for any republican the party can nominate.

Four years ago this time a left-wing bolt from Mr. Truman was well on its way under the uncertain leadership of Henry A. Wallace. The democratic convention later adopted a civil rights plan which projected a powerful state's rights bolt in the south.

Not much is left of these splinter and fringe parties today. The two major parties probably will fight it out among themselves. Eisenhower and Taft have run away from the republican pack. One or the other is almost sure to be nominated.

Nothing is certain in politics, however. The Taft-Eisenhower pre-convention campaign has become hot and angry. There is a bare chance, therefore, that a deadlock could force the republicans to a dark horse.

Harold E. Stassen is making a small bet on that. The chances of Gov. Earl Warren of California hang on such. More likely than either of them, however, would be the nomination of some republican closer to Taft — say Gen. Douglas MacArthur or Sen. Everett Dirksen of Illinois.

MacArthur is convention keynote. Dirksen will make Taft's nominating speech.
