Appointments Made to Central High School Staff

Independence — Henry Tetz, superintendent of school district No. 13C, has announced the following appointments by the school board to fill the vacancies at Central high school this fall.

Mrs. Joyce Ryman of Salem has been selected for the Home-making position at Central. Mrs. Ryman, a graduate of OSC with a degree in Home Economics, taught homemaking classes in Gervais high school for the past three years and was at Rose-

burg junior high for one year prior to that.

Frank A. Mazzio, teacher of English and Journalism at Nysa high school for the past two years, has been elected to the same position at Central high school. Mr. Mazzio is a graduate of Colorado State Teachers college from which he received both his bachelor and master degree. He is married and has one child.

Miss Sarah Backstrand, recent graduate of Oregon State college in mathematics, will teach mathematics classes at Central. Miss Backstrand is from Salem and will assume her first regular teaching duties this year.

The board announced the coaching staff for the coming season as follows: G. Sam Bell, former head coach at Wymore high school in Nebraska has been selected for the position of head coach of football and track and teacher at Central. Mr. Bell is replacing Sam Ramey who resigned recently to seek a position elsewhere. Mr. Bell is a graduate of Doane college in Nebraska where he was prominent in both football and track. He is attending the University of Oregon this summer where he will attend the coaching school and work towards his advanced degree. Mr. Bell is 24 years of age and is married. He comes highly recommended as both coach and teacher.

Warren J. Schue, assistant coach at Hillsboro union high school for the past four years, has been selected to coach basketball and baseball and also teach at Central. He is a graduate of the University of North Dakota and attended Purdue university for one year.

He participated in basketball and baseball at both universities and came to Coos Bay for his first year of teaching. At Coos Bay he taught in the junior high and assisted in the coaching at the senior high school there. Mr. Schue is 29 years of age, married and has two children.

He is replacing Mr. Williams of Junction City, who was selected but chose to stay in his present position when given a substantial increase in salary and new duties.

Marvin E. Heater, fifth year graduate of Linfield college, will teach physical education, science and assist with the coaching at Central. Mr. Heater was an outstanding football player at Linfield and assisted with the coaching duties both at Linfield and at McMinnville high school. Mr. Heater is married and lives at Newberg.

All vacancies in the Monmouth - Independence schools have been filled with the exception of the distributive education-typing position at Central.

West Stayton — The annual school election Herman Henrikson was elected school director of District No. 61, West Stayton, to serve for a three-year term. Henrikson replaces Bill Hudson.

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Long Holiday For Woodburn

Woodburn — Twenty-seven Woodburn stores will be closed on July 4 and 5 as well as public offices but many of the stores plan to be open until 8 p.m. Thursday, July 3, for the convenience of the customers. Grocery and drug stores plan to be open on July 5 as will the postoffice, both local banks, a few restaurants and most service stations.

The city hall will be closed both July 4 and 5, the postoffice will be closed all day July 4 but will be open as usual Saturday morning. The usual holiday schedule will be observed on July 4, no city or rural deliveries, but mail will be dispatched and received and distribution made to postoffice boxes.

Woodburn will be very quiet during the three day holiday with a large number of residents taking off for the beach or the mountains.

Plan Fireworks At McMinnville

McMinnville — What is believed to be the largest and longest fireworks display in the state will start exploding here at the Shodeo grounds, west of McMinnville, the night of July 4, at approximately 10 p.m.

Fifteen hundred dollars worth of every kind of fireworks imaginable will be featured in the 75-minute show, which is sponsored by the McMinnville volunteer firemen.

Not even the weather is going to worry the sponsors of the display for they have taken out a rain insurance policy, against any rain amounting to 5-100 of an inch, or more, that falls between 2 and 10 p.m. on the Fourth.

A total of 163 aerial shells will be set off. There'll be spider shells, comic shells, parachute shells, multiple break and even the "shell of shells" that was ordered all the way from Chicago.

There also will be many set pieces, such as the welcome display, the U.S. flag, Bugs Bunny, and finally the fire engine set, which will erupt smoke and water and have moving parts, all depicted in fireworks made up of six sections.

L. E. "Boxie" Tarbox of Portland, who made the sets, will be on hand to supervise the lighting of the fireworks.

A fire equipment display and show by the McMinnville volunteer firemen will precede the fireworks and is scheduled to get underway at 9 p.m.

Seek Fire Safety For Monmouth

Monmouth — The Monmouth Chamber of Commerce met in the Monmouth hotel dining room Tuesday evening and plans were made for the local Chamber and the Monmouth fire department to cooperate in a continuing program of removal of fire hazards in the homes of Monmouth.

The preliminary plans call for the two groups to start a two-year program. During the first year, plans call for publicity and home hazard check blanks to be sent to every home several times during the year. Listed on these blanks are the common danger points. The fire department and the Chamber of Commerce ask that each home owner check his home against the list and eliminate as many hazards as possible.

The second year plans call for employment of an inspector to check the homes of Monmouth and to call the home - owner's attention to possible danger points. Greatest hazards usually found are defective fuses and over-loaded electric circuits.

Various ways to finance the inspection were discussed by the Chamber, and a committee composed of Fire Chief Ralph DuToit, Gordon Barzee, Francis Haines and Charles Powell was appointed to proceed with the joint program and to work out financial details with the city council and the mayor.

It was decided by the Chamber to contribute an all-tuition scholarship to OCE for next year. Under the plan set up it will be granted on a term by term basis with the purpose to help a deserving athlete.

St. Paul Sees Old West Again

St. Paul — Th "old west" has been reborn again here this week as St. Paul stages its 17th annual rodeo Thursday, Friday and Saturday, July 3, 4 and 5. Cowpokes and their stock have set up "housekeeping" and scenes that bring a touch of nostalgia to old-timers are being repeated over and over again as St. Paul's "event of the year" gets under way.

There will be four rodeo performances, including one each night and a matinee on Friday, July 4.

Ray Manegre, president of the St. Paul Rodeo association, says "There is every reason to believe this will prove to be the biggest and best St. Paul rodeo in history as we have excellent stock and the best cowboys in the business."

The cowpokes will compete for \$8,600 in prize money, making the rodeo one of the richest in the west.

The program includes all of the regular rodeo fare, plus some "extras" such as Larry Lewis, trick roper and rider; Wes Curtis, laugh - provoking cowboy clown from San Diego, Calif., and the Torrances, Pat and Bug, of Pueblo, Colo., who do trick and Roman riding.

Margaret Smith, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Maurice Smith, is reigning as queen of the three-day wild west festival, together with her princesses, Beverly Van Dyke of Forest Grove and Jean Smith of Salem. All members of the rodeo's royal court are excellent horsewomen and will be seen riding at the rodeo grounds each night and Friday afternoon.

Friday — Independence day — will be the occasion for some added attractions, including an hour-long parade through St. Paul's main street in the morning, a ham dinner in the city hall, all day and a fireworks display at the rodeo grounds at night.

\$29,000 Pledge OCE Athletics

Monmouth — The state board of higher education at its meeting in Portland on June 18, approved a \$29,000 project submitted by Dr. Robert J. Maaske, president of OCE, for the improvement of the physical education and athletic sports area on the campus.

The allocation of funds provides for \$24,000 for the athletic fields and \$5,000 for the physical education areas.

The project for the improved stadium athletic facilities was worked out jointly with the school board, and Supt. Henry Tetz of District No. 13C.

The arrangement provides that the district will use the improved stadium facilities for their home football and baseball games and track meets. The district will provide practice fields for these sports at the high school.

The district and the college will share equally in the cost of the athletic field improvements to the existing college stadium. The district's cost will be paid in the form of annual rentals over a period of 10 to 12 years. The college will be the cost of current upkeep. The school board and the state board of higher education felt it would be economically unwise to have two costly stadiums only a mile apart.

The project contemplates extensive improvements, including the construction of a new track; revamping, raising the elevations, seeding a new turf, and installing a sprinkler system for the football field; construction of a football field; additions to the present field lights, minor renovations to the grandstand; and repairing and painting the fencing.

The physical education fields for college classes will be leveled and graded, fencing installed, lighting for the tennis courts, and other improvements made for college intramural and recreational activities.

The total project is to be planned this summer and is expected to be completed by September, 1953.

Catholics Lead Church Survey

Stayton — The Catholic denomination, with an estimated 164 families, is the largest single denomination in this area, according to a recently conducted survey of church affiliations.

The Stayton Ministerial association, assisted by volunteer workers, made a door-to-door canvass of homes in Stayton and as far outside it as the outskirts of Aumsville and Mehama, three miles south toward Seio, of the Jordan area and to the outskirts of Marion.

The estimate of the local Catholic church varies somewhat from the survey figure, the pastor figuring about 200 families in this parish.

Figures on Protestant membership refer to numbers of persons rather than of families and show the Church of Christ in the numerical lead with 239 stating a preference for this church.

Baptists follow with 215 and there were 119 stated preferences for the Methodist church. The Assembly of God was named as the preference of 50 persons, and the Church of God, Seventh Day, of 31 others. Of those interviewed, 73 listed no preference.

The rest of those interviewed or included in the tabulation were affiliated with the following sects: 17 with the Lutheran church, 11 with the Presbyterian, seven with the Friends church, six with the Nazarene, five with the Congregational, five with the Seventh Day Adventist, four with the Episcopal, three with the Evangelical United Brethren, and one with the Mormon church.

East Linn Co. Cherries Hit

Lebanon — Eastern Linn county's cherry crop was badly damaged by week-end rains state employment officials report. More than 2 1/2 inches of rain was recorded during the three days ending Sunday, with 1.90 inches coming Saturday.

Other crops suffered less damage. Many ripe raspberries were strewn on the ground. Heavy wind Sunday added to the damage.

At the Linn county fire patrol association headquarters in Sweet Home, the rainfall gauge showed 5.03 inches during the week ending Sunday.

Saturday's downpour brought the South Santiam river to flood stage at Lebanon, completely submerging the Mountain States power dam.

Farmers report damage to rye grasses which are beginning to mildew, but other grains and grass crops were not seriously damaged.

Strawberries were at the end of the growing season and did not suffer greatly.

Raspberry growers now face a picker shortage of 300 to 400 persons immediately after the week-end holiday, but until then have sufficient help in the fields to harvest the first pickings.
