

Heirloom Gown Worn At Nuptials

Olson of Corvallis, said their marriage vows Sunday afternoon at the Silverton First Methodist church. The Rev. Douglas Harrell read the lines of the double ring ceremony at 3 o'clock before the candlelight altar banked with trailing greenery and cathedral baskets of white delphiniums and gladioluses. Ushers lighted the tapers. Ronald Craven of Salem, sang, accompanied by Mrs. Craven who also played the organ wedding music.

The bride wore a family heirloom gown of old-ivory taffeta and brocade satin, the gown being first worn by the bride's great aunt in New York City in 1875. It was fashioned with a tight basque bodice, a deeper shade of fine pleating of the material at the throat, sleeves and back of the peplum. The full sweeping skirt had a taffeta front and a brocade satin train. "The bride's only ornament was a centuries-old Normandy cross, traditionally worn by every bride on the maternal side of her family. The veil of illusion and lace was tucked into a pleated shawl collar fashioned in the theme of the post Civil War gown. The bride carried a cascade bouquet of Dainty Maid bridal roses. The father of the bride presented her in marriage.
