Lebanon—A temporary order was issued Tuesday by Circuit Judge Victor Olliver restraining Everett L. Wiggins, builder of the Lebanon community swimming pool, from interference with its operation. The complaint was prepared by Kenneth Wilshire, city attorney.

The pool on the high school campus opened Tuesday morning and will operate daily from 11 a. m. to 2 p. m. and 6 to 9 p. m.

Tuesday's legal action follows many months dispute which came to a head Monday morning when it was found that the pool, which had been filled Saturday, had been partially drained by Wiggins, although entrance to drainage valves had been securely locked.

The controversy arose when the pool was first opened last August. According to J. W. King, city school superintendent, an inspection at that time showed some of the work unsatisfactory. During the summer and after the pool was drained some of the items were repaired King said, but other work remained to be done. On the advice of the architect, Cleo Jenkins, King said, \$1500 was withheld from payment to the contractor.

The school superintendent said that when the contractor failed to make complete repairs during the good weather this spring, Jenkins gave Wiggins written notice the work would be completed by the city, and the cost deducted from Wiggins' \$1500.

King then ordered the pool filled. Wiggins showed up late the same day, and drained the tank last Thursday, according to King. On Friday night, the council met in special session and informed the contractor the pool would open immediately, further warning that no interference on his part would be permitted.

Nevertheless, King said, Wiggins attempted to drain the pool again Monday. King had the valves shut after the water had dropped approximately two feet.
