Surcharges Authorized For Woodburn Water Users

Woodburn — An ordinance placing surcharges on patrons of the Woodburn Water Works for construction, maintenance and operation of sewer mains and sewage disposal plant and for paying principal and interest on the sewer bonds was adopted by the city council Tuesday evening.

The surcharges are to be added to bills for water use beginning Aug. 20, 1952. No emergency clause was attached to the ordinance and it will not become effective until 30 days after its passage.

Two different surcharges are provided for in the ordinance. One will amount to 40 cents per month to be collected from all users of water from the city system. The second will amount to 35 cents per month to be added to water bills of patrons in existing sewer districts in the city.

For the immediate future the first surcharge is designed to meet the interest and some principal payment on the bonds, and the second is intended to defray maintenance costs of the system and disposal plant.

The money is to be placed in a general sewer fund and can be used only on warrants authorized by the council for the purpose of "constructing, maintaining and operating sewer mains and a disposal plant and matters connected therewith and for the purpose of paying the principal and interest upon bonds issued under provisions of ordinance No. 928."
