Shortly after the installation of Judge Wendell Tompkins, the case of Raymond Crites and Jack W. Stamper, doing business as the Crites Tire Co., filed a complaint against M. A. Anderson asking judgment of \$491.72, the amount allegedly due for merchandise.

Second case, filed soon afterward, was that of Robert Kechnie vs. John W. Babcock, doing business as Babcock Truck and Equipment Co., a suit involving also a monetary claim.

Four more cases were filed Wednesday, three of them involving claims for property damages. Plaintiff in each of the three damage suits is the Premier Insurance company.

Traffic Accidents in Polk Co. Increase

Dallas—Recent figures released by Secretary of the State Earl T. Newbry show an increase in automobile accidents in Polk county in 1951 as compared to 1950. There was also an increase in the number of injuries but fatalities recorded a drop.

The survey shows 881 accidents in 1951 to 847 in 1950, an increase of 34. Injuries came to 263 in '51 as compared to 212 in '50. This shows an increase of 51. Deaths from automobile accidents dropped in 1951 with 5 fatalities recorded. In 1950 there were 8.
