Water Speed Record Broken

Seattle (AP)—Stanley Sayres whipped the screaming Slo-Mo-Shun IV to a world hydroplane record of 178.497 miles an hour Monday. It cracked the mark set two years ago by more than 18 m.p.h.

It was the fastest man ever has traveled on water.

In 1950 Sayres and the Slo-Mo started the speedboat world by boosting the world mark some 20 miles an hour to 160.3235 m.p.h.

That same year he won the Gold Cup Race and the Harmsworth Trophy in the speedy Slo-Mo.

Lake Washington's narrow east channel was choppy from a sharp breeze as Sayres came out at 8 a.m. PDT for his try at the record.

With the wind at his back, he ran the first mile of the test in

185.567 miles an hour. On the return against the wind he was clocked in 171.428.

The average for the two runs was taken as the official time.

David Neitling Will Visit U.N.

Stayton — David Neitling, selected earlier in the year in competition as Stayton's delegate on the IOOF-sponsored United Nations Pilgrimage for Youth, started the first leg of his 5958-mile trip July 4.

He will be accompanied to Portland by D. George Cole, author of the idea to send a delegate from here, representing the local Odd Fellows and Rebekah lodges. In Portland, David will meet other members of the Oregon delegation (there is also one from Salem), who will then drive to Spokane, point of departure for the northwest tour.

The group, which will include three members of the sponsoring organization, is traveling by chartered bus. In general, the itinerary is routed through Canada en route east, including also some stops in Minnesota and the trip down the Hudson to New York and Montreal. The return trip has been planned to include various points of American historical interest. Independence hall, Valley Forge, the national capitol and Gettysburg are a few of these.

The party will arrive in New York, July 13, remaining there through the six days of the pilgrimage proper. This phase of the trip is under direction of the national pilgrimage director and will include about five hours each day at UN sessions, sight-seeing tours of New York City and specially planned dinners and entertainment.
