Specific areas mentioned in the order are the north fork of Cedar creek, the old Tumble creek burn, the Blowout area, Boulder ridge, and the Bugaboo area.

## Stayton Reports Building Boom

Stayton — A new post office, seven new dwellings, two dwelling additions and house improvements accounted for the \$87,000 in building permits issued this week at the meeting of the city council.

The new postal building, on property being leased to the department by J. Clifford Likes, will be constructed on East High and Second Sts. at an estimated cost of \$12,000.

Other permits were to T. G. Freres for a \$24,000 dwelling, 80x100 ft., near the new hospital site; Lee Horner for a six room dwelling on West Ida St., estimated cost \$10,000; Ralph Showers, a five-room dwelling on W. Ida St., also \$10,000; Mike Dombrowsky for a dwelling on Third St., estimated cost \$6,000; J. H. McDaniel for a dwelling on Ferry St., estimated cost \$7,500, and to Tony Mack, for a six-room dwelling on W. Locust St., to cost approximately \$5,000.

O. R. Herrold, 606 Sixth St., and Mary Neitling, East High and Second Sts., were both issued permits for building additions with a stated value of \$5,000. Fred Camp, W. F. Basil and Dr. W. N. Pinter all were granted permits for minor home improvements.
