Woodburn Asks More Watches

Woodburn — The Woodburn air observation station at the Birds Eye cannery opened on schedule Monday, July 14, with enough volunteer observers registered to run three days, according to Harlow C. Dixon, Woodburn civil defense director, and Harold Eichsteadt, assistant director.

Although the number of volunteers registered is far short of the 84 required, it is hoped by the directors that by personal work enough more may be obtained to carry on the required time. Volunteers may register at the city hall or with Dixon or Eichsteadt.

This is not just a Woodburn defense action but is a part of the work in 27 border states of the United States.

Of special interest to Woodburn is the fact that Maj. Donald E. Jones, commanding officer of the state air force ground observers group, and who signed the orders received in Woodburn, is a former Woodburn boy and well known to many Woodburn residents. He graduated from the Woodburn schools and at one time delivered Capital Journal on one of the Woodburn paper routes.

Eichsteadt stated that no one will be asked to serve as observer more than four hours in any week and if enough volunteers are obtained it will only be necessary to serve four hours in every two weeks.

A few husband and wife teams have volunteered. Many Woodburn organizations have been contacted without success and the response has been very poor for a community of this size. A list of volunteers will be published this week.

Caneberry Peak Season Nearing

Lebanon—Caneberry harvest is reaching peak proportions in the east Linn area. A need for 200 more pickers is the estimate of state employment officials at Lebanon.

Transportation is furnished from Sweet Home and Lebanon to the main patches in the Linn area. Growers are paying 80 cents a crate with a 10 cent bonus.

Lancomb's blackcap growers are paying 25 cents per five-quart pail.

Woodburn Still Needs Watchers

Woodburn — Although the number of volunteers needed for the Woodburn air observation post, scheduled to open Monday, July 14, has fallen far short of the 84 minimum required, Harold Eichsteadt, assistant Woodburn defense director, states that the post will open Monday as scheduled.

It is hoped more observers will volunteer after the start of the station and that it may be kept in operation for the required time.

Although only 15 observers have registered at the city hall Eichsteadt has been doing personal work for the last few days and is trying hard to secure the required number.

The post here was ordered activated on a 24-hour a day basis, beginning Monday, by the air force along with airplane spotting stations in 27 border states of the United States.

Anyone over 18 years of age, either men or women, may serve as observers. No experience is required. Volunteers need only to see, hear and use a telephone. Trained observers will be available to assist. The post is located on the ground floor of the Birds-Eye plant here.
