The amateur hour show will be staged outdoors at the carnival grounds Wednesday night, July 30. A higher than usual number of advance entries for this event are announced by Edw. J. Bell and Mrs. Eva Humphreys, co-chairmen. They are soliciting further singing, dancing, instrumental and comedy acts.

The time of the grand festival parade has been changed from 6:30 to 7 p.m. on Friday, Aug. 1, according to M. J. Martin, chairman of this event. All individuals, firms and organizations have been invited to enter floats in the grand parade.

Saturday, August 2, the final day of the show, the whole afternoon will be devoted to a horse parade and horse show. Gene Teague is in charge of this part of the festival and has lined up an impressive array of horsemen, including Danny Campbell, owner of the northwest's outstanding parade horse, and an afternoon of riding contests and events.

There will be the traditional carnival and dance; also the bean-hole bean feed and many other special attractions.

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Beats Zoning Rule at Albany

Albany — A. M. Ropp has won his appeal from an Albany municipal court conviction of violating the municipal zoning ordinance.

Judge Fred McHenry in circuit court handed down a memorandum opinion holding that Ropp, operating the Northrup & King seed processing plant is entitled to store sacked seed on property adjacent to the plant site even though the property had been zoned as residential.

The city had contended that such storage was in effect an extension of an industrial use to a residential area.

Judge McHenry upheld the defense that "the use complained of was a use customarily incident to the use that was established on the property prior to the passing of the zoning ordinance."
