Fikan Becomes Woodburn Head

Woodburn — An ordinance was adopted at the Woodburn city council Tuesday night electing Jess Fikan as council president and acting mayor due to the fact that Mayor Elmer Mattson left Wednesday on a trip to Sweden. Fikan will serve as mayor until Nov. 19, 1952.

A proposal was put in action under which local individuals would put up \$1,000 each to guarantee sale of the Woodburn athletic field lighting bonds and facilitate an early start on completion of the project before football season. Five men present at the session agreed to participate in the program, and if five more contributors can be obtained the municipal recreation and park board will start work on the project at once. The funds advanced would be repaid when the bonds are sold.

Those agreeing to put up the \$1,000 subscriptions were Mayor Elmer Mattson, Councilmen H. M. Austin, and Jess Fikan and O. L. Withers of the recreation and park board. This leaves only five more subscriptions to be obtained.

Other action included granting permission to the PGE Co. to remove an iron light pole on the corner of First and West Cleveland and replace it with a new light pole on the opposite corner; granting Dr. Delbert Reed permission to build a 22x40 foot medical building on Hayes street between his old residence and the Ahrens hardware store; authorizing the placing of 25 miles per hour speed limit on George St.; placing a street light at the intersection of Stark and Ogle St.; and removal of an old light at South Front and Cherry Sts.

Authorization was also made for a spray program to control mosquitoes. At the conclusion of the meeting Mayor Mattson was presented with a gift from the councilmen and city officers and bidden bon voyage.

Berry pickers with sufficient persistence and immunity to thorns may be rewarded with enough wild blackberries for a pie or a few glasses of jelly by combing clearing areas around Detroit.

Blackberries grow profusely in cut-over areas, thriving particularly around stumps or over fallen snags.

The abundant rains of June helped produce large, juice-filled berries this year, according to those who have been fortunate enough to find them.

Suggested picking areas include the lower Blowout area, the reservoir area, the Breitenbush road and cut-over spots around Idanha.

Two small fires were reported by the Detroit ranger station to have been extinguished in the clearing in the lower Blowout area Wednesday.

The larger fire which burned over half an acre was believed to have flared up as a remnant from clearing fires in the area nearly two months ago. The smaller, according to forest service personnel, may have been caused accidentally by a berry picker or fisherman.

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Lebanon Gets Housing Project

Lebanon—The city will take over ownership of the federal housing projects on August 1, the city council was told this week by Kenneth Wilshire, city attorney. He was advised by the San Francisco district office of the public housing authority that a letter approving the sale of the units here was in the mail.

Under the contract between the city and the government, the city will pay the federal government \$8,826.50 for the land on which the units stand. The 80 housing units are included in the transfer.

This marks completion of three year's effort by Lebanon to keep the housing area from being razed on completion of the government housing program.

The city will now own two projects, including the 60 units in the city housing area adjoining the federal units. The two housing areas cover 12.4 acres of ground at Fifth and Rose streets, of which 1.9 acres are devoted to streets.

No immediate change in administrative policy is indicated. Other property acquisitions this week included city purchase for \$25,000 of the old hospital and annex on Second street.

The brick building will be used for city library quarters. A citizens' committee composed of representatives from various service organizations will advise the council as to the use of the annex property.

It was first proposed that it should be paved for a parking lot but many groups have requested that it be converted into a public park with an outdoor reading area next to the library.

2 Marion Cities Reply On Sewage Accusations

Mt. Angel—Attending the hearing in Portland Friday will be Mayor Jacob Berchtold, City Attorney W. Douglas Harris, and Councilmen Carl Mucken, Louis A. LeDoux, A. A. Ebner and Joseph Wagner, to answer charges of river pollution against 10 Oregon cities made by the State Sanitary Commission.

"Mount Angel's first sewer disposal plant was constructed in 1915," Mayor Berchtold said. "At that time 125 sewer connections served a population of 545. The disposal plant was built by Louis Kelsey, engineer, and received the O.K. from the State Board of Health."

"Today, almost after 40 years, we only have a population of some 1315, and have 182 sewer connections."

"In 1938, city had a complete sewer treatment plant worked out by Cunningham and associates, and at a public meeting, the citizens voted it down."

Before 1939, the city sewer outlet went through the lower lands, and in 1939, with the O.K. of the State Board of Health and Federal Works Administration, the city built an entirely new sewer outlet, and spent some \$5439, and made a direct outlet to the Pudding river.

"In 1945 the city started a sinking fund for city sewage disposal, and to date the fund is \$23,000."

"In 1948 the city instructed Cunningham and associates to make plans for a new sewer treatment plant, which they did including a complete sewer map for the city. After many measurements from the State Board of Health and Cunningham and associates, the State Board of Health informed the engineers that the waste of the Mount Angel Co-operative Creamery is equal to that of 3000 people, and to build a new sewage treatment plant, without any mains nor a new site would cost at an estimate of \$120,000."

"The city met with the Mt. Angel creamery, and the creamery took up the matter with the State Board of Health, in February, 1949, and they informed the State Board of Health that because the farmers around here are not keeping as many cows as they did, the fresh milk is going to the cities and the creamery is not making as much butter and cheese as it used to. Due to the foregoing facts, the city and the creamery have as yet been unable to arrive at a fair agreement on splitting costs."

"The State Board of Health promised to make a new survey of the needs of the city and creamery, and when this survey is received the engineers will be able to complete plans to be presented to the city and the State Board of Health."

"Two weeks ago the mayor and councilmen walked the complete distance from the inlet to the outlet of the sewer, and the only odor they found was where the sewer tile drained into the open ditch one-half mile away from the septic tank, which is still two miles from the Pudding river. Every two years the city cleans this ditch and keeps it in full repair."

"Numerous small clean streams also empty into this ditch which help to purify it before reaching the Pudding river. Many of the towns empty raw sewage right into the streams, whereas Mt. Angel's septic tank is nearly three miles from Pudding river."

"Considering these facts, Mt. Angel cannot understand how the city sewer pollutes the Pudding river. The Pudding river is a slow dirty moving river, and if samples were taken at the sewer outlet where it empties into the river, they would not find any trouble there."

Skywatch on At Woodburn

Woodburn—"Operation Skywatch" the round-the-clock airplane spotting activated by the air force, opened on schedule Monday morning with citizen volunteers on duty at the Woodburn station, located on the ground floor of the Birds Eye cannery here.

Many new observers were signed up last week but many more are needed to keep the post in operation.

Harold Eichsteadt, assistant director of civilian defense in Woodburn, is calling for volunteers for one shift only to be on call as emergency substitutes if not able to volunteer for regular shifts.

Fifty-one volunteers were registered at the beginning of the operation and 42 shifts are working with one person on each shift and nine shifts with two people working. Residents of the area wishing to help may register at the city hall, Black 44, or by calling Eichsteadt or Harlow C. Dixon, local civilian defense director.
