Savory Fried Chicken
Ingredients: One 3 to 3½ pound frying chicken, ¼ cup flour, 1½ teaspoons salt, freshly-ground pepper (to taste), 1 teaspoon paprika, ¼ teaspoon monosodium glutamate, ¼ teaspoon dry mustard, ½ cup butter or margarine.

Method: Have butcher cut chicken breast, wings, legs, and second joints so that you have 8 pieces; make stock for gravy out of giblets, wing tips, neck and bony part of back. Shake flour, salt, pepper, paprika, monosodium glutamate, and dry mustard together in heavy paper bag; add chicken pieces and shake to coat thoroughly. Melt butter or margarine in 12-inch skillet over moderate heat; add chicken pieces and brown well. Cover tightly and cook until tender over low heat. Remove chicken and make gravy from drippings in pan. Makes 4 to 5 servings. Note: If chicken sticks after it is covered add a few tablespoons of stock to skillet.
