Milton Mason Dies at Astoria

Milton C. Mason, at one time a resident of Jefferson, died Friday at his home in Astoria. He apparently had been in good health. Death was caused by a cerebral hemorrhage.

Mason was born July 24, 1899, in Ohio and the family came to Oregon in 1907 and lived at Jefferson. He attended the Jefferson schools, and in May, 1917, enlisted in the United States navy for service in World War I.

After the war he returned to Jefferson, attended the University of Oregon for a year and a

half and was later employed in the post office at Albany.

Mason joined the Coast Guard in 1923, serving until his retirement in 1948 with the rank of lieutenant junior grade.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Edith Mason of Astoria; daughter, Nancy Jo Mason of Seattle; a son, George C. Mason of Seattle; mother, Mrs. Mary E. Mason of Jefferson; sisters, Mrs. Rose M. Jones of Cleveland, Ohio, Miss Virginia Mason of Jefferson, Mrs. Maratha E. Riley of New Orleans, Mrs. Laura M. Doyle of Newport Beach, Cal.; brothers, Lloyd M. Mason of Salem, and High Mason of Los Angeles.

Although light is often thought of as including only visible rays, there are invisible rays such as ultra-violet and infra-red which act in the same manner as light and are often called light.

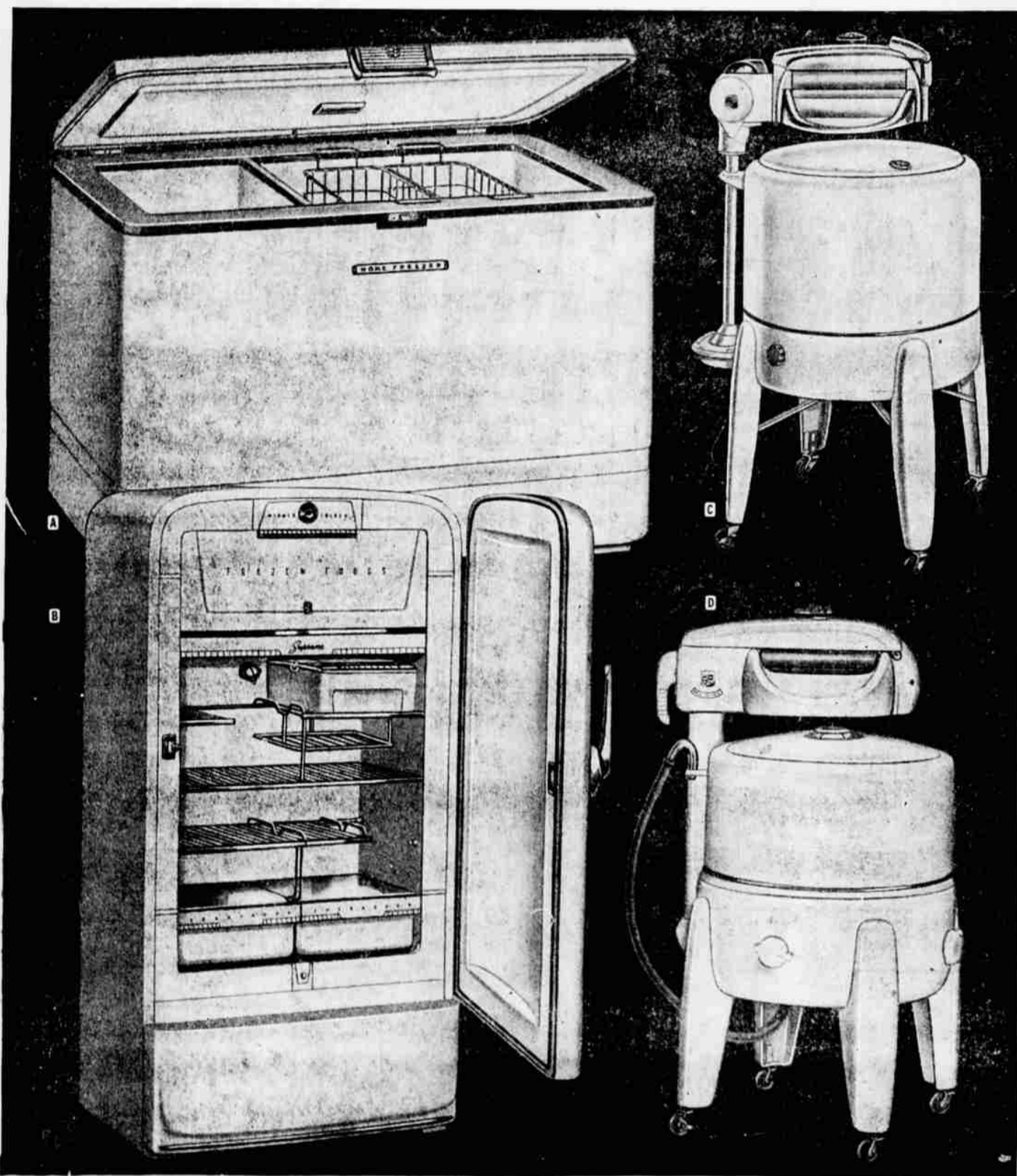
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
