Dallas — Arrangements for the 12th annual Willamette valley ram sale to be held in Albany, Saturday, Aug. 2, are complete according to word received from O. E. Mikesell, sale secretary. This year's sale is at the Linn county fair grounds, just east of Albany near Waverly lake on Highway 99E.

The sale is scheduled to start at 10 a.m., standard time, with Col. Earl O. Walter of Filer, Idaho, calling for bids on the 200 head of purebred rams and ewes. Breeds included in this year's sale are Romney, Suffolk, Hampshire, Lincoln, Southdown, Shropshire, Corriedale, Dorset, Columbia and Cotswold.

Mail or wire bids will be accepted from sheepmen who are unable to attend the sale. Bids should be sent to the secretary in the courthouse at Albany or to the sales manager, E. F. Hubbard, Rt. 4, Corvallis.

All rams and ewes are to be at the sale grounds by 7 a.m., standard time, on Aug. 2 so that prospective buyers will have an opportunity to inspect the various lots.

Mikesell says that a new kitchen has been constructed at the fair grounds so buyers will no longer have to eat in the sales barn.

Constellation Scorpius Now Visible in Evening

As it has been two years since the constellation known as Scorpius (the scorpion) and its beautiful star Antares (three syllables with accent on second) were discussed in this column, we shall attempt here to point it out unmistakably to any who have sufficient interest to spend a few minutes under the deepening twilight skies.

An hour after sunset, the brighter celestial objects should be distinctly visible. At that time look fairly low in the sky almost due south and you will sight a decidedly reddish star as it energetically twinkles. Since it represents the heart of the Scorpion, we can quite well say we see the throbbing of this vital organ.

Do not mistake another red object, the planet Mars, for Antares. Mars is farther to the right, brighter and almost in the southwest. Mars is moving toward Antares and will be very close to it in early September. It will be interesting to watch this planet's movement among the so-called "fixed stars."

For those at latitude 45 degrees north, the entire Scorpion can be traced if the southern horizon is level and free of obstructions. Those farther south will see the entire figure a little higher in the sky, while those

New Well Will Be Tested at Woodburn

Woodburn — The new Woodburn city well on the triangular tract bounded by Settlemier, West Hayes and Bottle Ave., was down to its maximum depth, 190 feet, last week as reported by Adrian Scholer, city water superintendent. The casing is to be perforated at the 170 foot level in a four-foot strata of rock and a test run will be made soon. The well is guaranteed to deliver at least 600 gallons per minute.
