Polk County 4-H Leaders Plan Exhibitions at Fair

Dallas—Polk County 4-H leaders met last week to discuss plans for the coming 4-H exhibits at the 1952 Polk County fair.

According to Jack Evey, Polk county extension agent, this year's fair will see an increase in exhibits over last

year. 4-H members in the county are being encouraged to make their entries early so that space requirements can be determined.

The 4-H division of the fair will include exhibits in livestock, home economics, vegetable crops and other miscellaneous projects such as electricity, woodworking and forestry.

The livestock exhibits will include rabbits and poultry. The clubs will have an opportunity to participate in judging contests, the winners of which will represent Polk county at the Oregon State Fair and Pacific International Livestock Exposition in Portland.

Demonstration contests will be held throughout the course of the three-day fair. A special feature this year will be a Saturday evening program put on by the 4-H Leader's Association.

The program will include the girl's style review, in which 4-H club members carrying clothing projects will model garments made during the last year. In addition to the style review there will be an entertainment program featuring musical and other numbers.

Rules governing exhibits, information concerning special contests and a complete program of the activities for the fair are in the 1952 premium list. Premium lists are available in the county extension office in the basement of the Polk county courthouse.

Complete Final Plans for 6th Silvertown Horse Show

Silvertown—Final plans are being completed by the Silvertown Chamber of Commerce for the 6th Annual Western Horse Show which will be held at 8 p.m. Aug. 2 at McGinnis Field.

The event will open with a parade at 4 p.m.

Boosters for the show appear daily on the streets in costume, maroon blouses, large hats, white neck sashes with black lettering, boots and spurs, or a mere riding whip.

At the downtown parade Saturday afternoon, Norman Eastman will be commentator, located at a stand in Main and Water Sts.

With the idea of a future museum building for relics dating to the antique era, the parade manager chairman, Charles Mason, is soliciting all horse-drawn vehicles, the older the more welcome, to enter the parade.

A parade features include the Tillamook Sheriff's posse with a chuck wagon outfit.

Parade chairman, Mason, is still seeking a two-wheeled cart, a four-wheeled covered buggy, a buckboard, a lumber wagon, some rig with side boards, an end gate and a high-in-the-air squeakin' spring seat with a four (or more) horse (or mule) team, or an ox team, and a "survivor with the fringe on top."

Prizes will be awarded the best in the west parade.

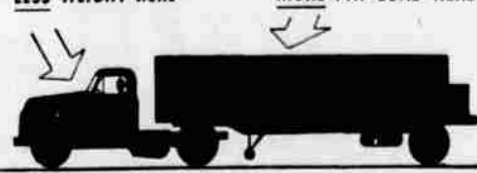
