For Veterans—About a million U. S. armed service veterans discharged after June 26, 1950, can use this application to request from \$100 to \$300 that is coming to them in mustering out pay. The services do not furnish printed forms. This blank should be pasted on a letter-sized sheet. The services specify applications must be typed or printed except for the signature. About three and a half million men now in service will become eligible as they are discharged.

Schroeder at Mexico College

Mexico City (Special)—Richard Clifford Schroeder of Route 8, Box 801, Salem, is combining vacation and travel with education this summer by attending Mexico City college located in Mexico's capital, the second largest city in Latin America.

Students do not have to know a word of Spanish to enroll at Mexico City college, as all but five per cent of the classes are taught in English. Most students, however, take Spanish as one of their courses and find they learn the language rapidly by practicing it in every restaurant, store, and marketplace.

Students at MCC are increasing their knowledge of Mexico by going on college-sponsored trips at nominal cost. They see the great 1500-year old Pyramid of the Sun and the Temple of Quetzacoatl at Teotihuacan. At Chapultepec Castle, former palace of Emperor Maximilian, they see the handsomely furnished palace of Emperor Maximilian, and the gold and silver regal coach once used by the tragic Maximilian and Carlota for state affairs.

Schroeder is taking courses in Spanish under the Murray system of idiomatic instruction developed at MCC and now being adopted in the U.S. He served six years in the U.S. Navy in World War II. Previous to enrolling at MCC he attended Willamette university in Salem and was employed as a salesman. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. A. G. Schroeder of the same address.

How to Take Picture Of Flying Saucer at Night

How would you photograph a "flying saucer" at night? This was a matter of earnest discussion recently due to the experience of a seasoned reporter for AP Newsfeatures, Saul Pett.

Lolling comfortably on the porch of his New Jersey home, he was listening to the midnight news report one Saturday night. His attention was idly caught by a light which came into view in the skies.

"That's funny," he thought. "No light blinking on that plane. And no sound of the motor... and what a peculiar glow!"

Suddenly he became alert, observant.

He followed its straight path across the heavens until it was lost from view. He noted it seemed to have depth and was lighted as though from within. He judged it was visible for about a minute and a half.

When he recounted his experience at the office on Monday morning, Saul took a lot of kidding. There were varied allusions as to the state of his hearing, visit and general sobriety.

"Why didn't you take a picture of it?" I asked him.

"Aside from the fact that I didn't have a camera loaded with film and ready to shoot," he replied, "I wouldn't know how to go about it."

That night in a report from Washington, the Air Force disclosed that National Airport radar operators had picked up unidentified aerial "objects" on their radar screens around midnight of the past Saturday.

At the same time they were sighted visually by two airline pilots aloft.

There's no harm in giving some thought to saucer photography.

Obviously, a camera must be handy and ready for instantaneous shooting at all times. Getting it, setting the lens wide open, the lens at infinity and preparing to shoot should be a matter of seconds only.

After discussion with several news photographers, it was agreed that shooting this luminous object at night was similar to taking pictures of an eclipse. This meant a steady support for the camera, if it were not already on a tripod.

When the camera is aimed at the sky, it would be preferable to keep a landmark visible if possible—such as a tree top, a roof, a spire. Such a relationship is valuable, later on, in computing the distance, altitude and possibly speed.

The shutter could be set on Time, Bulb, or a one-second exposure depending on which you could operate smoothly, continuously for a series of exposures on the same negative.

To avoid jarring the camera, the camera could be set on Time, the lens opened. Then use the lens cap, film slide or a piece of cardboard to cover the lens at intervals. Actually, you would be plotting the course of a luminous object across the film.

Depending on the brilliance of the object, it might barely be possible to take a single snap of the object at a tenth or a fifth of a second.

It would be something to try, if time permitted, but much longer time exposures would be more likely to record something on the film.

If you wish to practice for the night when you might sight a glowing "light," nature and man have provided convenient stand-ins in the shape of the moon and passing airplanes. With the moon you can have plenty of time for

unhurried preparation and calculations. Passing airplanes provide elements of suspense and luck and will prove whether you can shoot a moving target with hair-trigger accuracy.

Of course if "flying saucers" had any consideration at all for the peace of mind of amateur photographers, they would make their appearance in broad daylight in a cloudless sky just as

Three Youths Get 10 Years

Frank Delano Brewster, 1143 Seventh street, Robert L. Morris, Route 2, and Roger Allon Howard of Route 4 were sentenced to 10 years in the state prison Thursday by Judge Rex Kimmell for burglary of the Salem Speed Shop last June 4.
