American Legion auxiliary convention delegates of Salem returned from Klamath Falls this week bringing back with them awards, citations and committee appointments which were given their units and individual members.

The convention, which began July 26, closed Wednesday with about 420 American Legion auxiliary women in attendance.

Mrs. Robert S. Kreson of Dallas was elected president of the Oregon American Legion women's auxiliary and Mrs. Harry Humphreys of Stayton was elected District Two vice president.

Mrs. Earl Andresen, delegate from the Marion county 8 at 40 club, was appointed state membership chairman at the 8 at 40 departmental march.

Capital unit, No. 9, was awarded for the third consecutive year the Wilda Thorn membership trophy, giving the unit permanent possession of the trophy.

Mrs. Lue Lucas, composer of the unit's "Unit History" was given a personal cash award for her work. Capital unit's scrapbook was awarded a first place honor.

On the resolution committee at the convention was Mrs. Anson B. Ingels, president of Capital unit. Mrs. Jack Simkins, president of Salem unit, No. 136, of the American Legion auxiliary was on the credentials committee.

Awards received by Salem unit, No. 136, includes the national citation for "enrolling a 1952 membership equal to the membership of 1951." Department citations given to this unit were a citation for service in the department program, a cash award from the department for the unit having the greatest numerical gain over quota of members and also a cash award for the unit submitting the best all-around Americanism report. Desire of Both Conventions Was to Have Winning Teams

Washington, (AP)—The two political conventions of 1952 will be analyzed and interpreted for years, helped by leaks on what happened behind closed doors. That's the custom.

But, although there were some subtle and some not-so-subtle struggles in Chicago, everything that happened there was secondary to the main point which already is clear enough: The overwhelming desire of both parties to win the November elections.

This meant subordinating everything else to the selection of the two men who looked like the best vote-getters.

The Democrat's choice of Gov. Stevenson was a little more complex than the selection of Gen. Eisenhower by the Republicans.

With his immense prestige and reputation for leadership, Eisenhower had demonstrated his popularity over Sen. Taft in the preferential primaries and the public opinion polls.

The Republicans were not making a new kind of decision in rejecting Taft or committing themselves to international cooperation, which Eisenhower advocated.

Twice before, Republican conventions, in 1940 and 1948, were present during the afternoon.

Miss Hildegarde Dierkhising of Woodburn cut the decorated cake and Mrs. Ann Walker of Mt. Angel, mother of Mrs. Don Equall, presided at the punch bowl. Mrs. Charles Mason assisted in serving and Mrs. Alfred Aicher passed the guest book.

Louise Owens Describes Youth Pilgrimage to UN

Watching the United Nations work was the prime objective of the Odd Fellowship third annual "United Nations Pilgrimage for Youth."

However, for the group from the northwest, which included a Salem girl, Louise Owens, and a Stayton boy, David Neitling, it was more than that. It was a lesson in international relations and in history of this country and of Canada.

In the group were young people from British Columbia and also three from Alberta, Canada. Also, much of the trip east by bus was made through Canada and the young Americans had a taste of Canadian hospitality.

Six days were spent in New York City but during the rest of the time, July 5-July 27 the group of 33 young people (14 of them from Oregon) and four chaperons were visiting other spots of interest along their route, though the visits were brief.

Miss Owens, who returned to her home here Sunday after a visit to Grand Coulee Dam with seven of the other Oregon delegates and the IOOF people bringing them from Spokane where they left their bus, not only kept notes of her trip but returned with a number of pictures and folders, that she will show to the Salem IOOF lodge which sponsored her.

The general assembly of the United Nations was not in session when the group from the northwest was there, so they vis-

ited the economic and social council and the trusteeship council and heard several UN speakers.

Louise, herself, chose to visit the economic and social council where she heard a speaker from Belgium and one from the Philippines and just beginning to speak when she had to leave was a speaker from Poland. The talks, she said, were all translated into five different languages with the translation being made as the speaker was talking.

Of the council meeting she commented: "It is the largest of the United Nations councils, you know. When I visited there they were reporting on the world economic conditions. I was amazed at how much work they put into it." Then she added, "While we were at the meeting Mrs. Roosevelt came in for a little bit. We wanted to go over and speak to her but did not get to do it."

The United Nations headquarters was described as being very modern and very unusual with the Secretariat building being glass and aluminum on two sides and marble on two sides.

Among the UN speakers the group heard were Dr. William Agar, special services division of the UN, who explained the organization of the United Nations; speakers for the trustee council, world health organization and United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund, and a speaker, who explained simultaneous interpretation.

15th Girls Camp Opens Sunday, Mrs. Gus Moore in Charge

Sunday, Aug. 3, will mark the opening of the 15th consecutive year of camping for girls from this district at Camp Silver Creek under the auspices of the Y.M.C.A.

A capacity camp of 130 girls from 13 different Oregon towns and several from the state of Washington have signed up for camp in the largest group yet to enroll for this 10-day period.

A well-rounded program of recreational and educational activities is offered. Horseback riding is a popular diversion and other activities will be swimming, archery, tumbling, hiking, horseshoes, tetherball and fishing. Skills will be taught in handicraft and campcraft.

The many traditional events will be carried on again. These include opening ceremonies at the first campfire, costume banquet, stunt night, picnic at Silver Creek Falls park, water carnival and candlelight ceremony at the last campfire.

Precaution is taken for the health and safety of the campers. Free medical examinations are being provided at the Y.M.C.A. Thursday evening. A registered nurse is on duty at all times and at least two lifeguards are on duty during swim periods, with the "buddy system" being used by the campers. Hot showers are available, lots of rest and the good food for which Camp Silver Creek is famous.
