Court Jurisdiction At Albany Sought

Albany — Members of the Linn County Bar association have set the wheels in motion, following a meeting Tuesday, which would resolve the question of the respective jurisdictions of Albany's justice court and the new district court. C. S. Emmons, president of the association, announced Wednesday.

As the matter now stands, chapter 589 of Oregon Law, left some loose ends which allowed for overlapping of functions and powers of the two courts.

The 1947 law established a district court in counties meeting specific conditions. It was decided that the site of the court should be in the county seat, and that justice courts within the county seat should be abolished.

But since the justice court has jurisdiction not only within the county seat but also outside it, the legal question has arisen which calls for an official ruling, the lawyers feel.

The four justice courts within Linn county have countywide jurisdiction. The question involves only the justice court in Albany, since it is the county seat.
