Employment Solid, Lebanon Reports

Lebanon — The employment office reports that in the latter part of July there has been less labor turnover and fewer job openings in the Lebanon area. Non-agricultural placements for July were about the same as in June. Lumber and wood products showed the largest increase in employment with retail trade declining in July as compared with June of this year. There were less jobs in construction work this July than a year ago. In agriculture, berry picking afforded jobs to almost twice as many people the past month as compared to a year ago. Bean picking, starting later this year, is just getting under way.

Employment outlook for next month indicates an even balance between labor and demand with a possible increase in construction and decrease in logging operations due to humidity.

Stayton Starts Bean Harvest

Stayton — This was the first real week of bean picking in the West Stayton and North Santiam areas. Growers announced "first pickings" in their fields on Monday and there was a night picking crew established by Tuesday.

Picking will continue until the first part of September.

For several weeks, pickers have sifted in and out of Stayton looking for work. Some growers' camps were almost empty, however, last week as the late crop sent pickers on to other areas. A picker shortage is definitely anticipated here now.

A temporary headquarters has been established by the Oregon State Employment Service at Goss' bean yard in West Stayton.

Everything points to a record crop this year, despite the fact that bean acreage was cut back.

Lebanon Schools to Open Classes Sept. 4

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Stayton Plans New Skywatch

Stayton — The air observation post, inactive since the close of World War II, will be reactivated here, it was disclosed this week by Rev. Nick Neufeld, civil defense director.

This area lags behind the others in Marion county in civil defense, said Rev. Neufeld, who has taken steps toward re-establishing the air-watch and toward creating a full-scale disaster plan. Mrs. Eugene Spaniol will again act as chairman of the air observation volunteer program.

A 24-hour air watch will be undertaken. Volunteers will be asked to stand four-hour watches. If anyone can stand a partial watch, their help also will be needed. Where possible, teams of two persons will be assigned to watches to relieve fatigue, boredom or loneliness of the vigil.

The post will again be set up at the intersection of Third St. and Fern Ridge Rd. There is a city-owned trailer house there which will be the headquarters of air observers. The trailer also has a coffee-maker, says Neufeld.
