Today's Menu

Sunday Night Supper
Clam Chowder Pilot Crackers
Egg-stuffed Tomato Halves
Bread and Butter
Peach Shortcake Beverage

Egg-Stuffed Tomato Halves
Ingredients: 5 medium-sized tomatoes, salt, 4 hard-cooked eggs, 2 tablespoons commercially-prepared tartar sauce, 1 teaspoon cider vinegar, ¼ teaspoon salt, freshly-ground pepper (to taste), paprika, salad greens, black olives.

Method: Remove stem end from tomatoes with small sharp knife; cut each in half vertically. Remove heart from tomato halves and scoop out seeds. Sprinkle with salt and place cut side down to drain. Put eggs through ricer or mash fine; mix in tartar sauce, vinegar, ¼ teaspoon salt and pepper. Stuff tomato halves with egg mixture; sprinkle with paprika. Serve on salad greens with black olives. Makes 5 servings, using 2 tomato halves for each portion.

Good snack: arrange sardines on buttered toast and sprinkle with a little lemon juice mixed with Worcestershire sauce. Top with grated yellow cheese and broil slowly until cheese melts. Serve with well-seasoned tomato juice as a first course.
