School Sept. 15 At Woodburn

Woodburn — Monday, Sept. 15, will be the opening date of the Woodburn high and grade schools, according to a decision by the Woodburn school board. St. Luke's parochial school will also open on the same date. The closing date of the public schools was set for June 3, with an earlier termination possible if the demand for strawberry harvest workers becomes critical next spring.

Teachers will report on Sept. 8 for a four-day in-service workshop session preceding the opening of school.

Mrs. Mildred Odgers, principal of the Lincoln grade school, has tendered her resignation, which was accepted by the board, and will take a position as a supervisor in the Marion county school office. Her successor will be Miss Gertrude Wampole, former teacher, who resigned in 1951 to go into business. She will serve as principal of the Lincoln school and teach one section of the first grade.

Dental and physical examinations for all first grade children, students entering high school and others new in the district, before the opening of school, are being urged.

Study Fire Calls For Woodburn

Woodburn — The problem of how to handle fire calls in Woodburn and for the rural fire protection district and police calls in the city when the dial telephone system is installed in Woodburn this winter was the main topic of discussion at the regular council meeting this week.

However, no decision was reached and members of the council are meeting Friday night with the board of directors of the rural fire protection district in an attempt to work out a solution.

The resignation of Neil Calkins as chief of police was tendered and accepted by the council, effective Sept. 1. Les Church, now on the police force, was named temporarily as chief until the return of Mayor Elmer Mattson and another man is to be hired temporarily in Church's old position.

Calkins has been on the police force nearly three years and is resigning to accept a position at the MacLaren School for Boys.

The bid of Central Paving Co. of Salem for paving the portion of Arthur St. from Third St. to Settlement Ave. was accepted.

The short portion of the Hillsboro-Silverton highway was taken over by the city recently was designated as "Silverton Road." Permission was granted the telephone company to run conduit containing cables under Front, Settlement, Tomlin and Young Sts. on condition that all pavement be replaced properly.

Reports were received from the state health department reporting water in the new well as meeting the bacteria test and designating the Woodburn War Memorial swimming pool as "Grade A."

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Linn Co. Jury List Enlarged

Albany — On order of Circuit Judge Victor Olliver Wednesday the Linn county commissioners added 19 names to the jury panel drawn for the September term of court and filed a list of prospective jurors in the office of County Clerk R. M. Russell.

Judge Olliver's order for more members of the panel, ordinarily limited to 31 persons, seven of whom make up the grand jury, was based on the transfer to his court of the second trial of Mrs. Sigurd Hansen, who was convicted in Benton county in January, 1951, of the murder of her husband and sentenced to life imprisonment. On appeal the supreme court ordered a new trial, and the case was transferred here when a change of venue was asked. Murder trials normally exhaust more panel members than other types of cases. The trial is set for the week beginning October 20.

The grand jury has not been taken out of the jury list this time, since District Attorney Courtney Johns decided to hold the May grand jury over into the September term.
