Woodburn Starts New Sewer System

Woodburn — Work of laying the main trunk sewers for the new Woodburn system by the P. S. Lord Mechanical Contractors of Portland, is progressing rapidly.

Ten-inch mains have been installed west from the disposal plant site to the railroad tracks and 18-inch mains are now going in to the south. The ditch was extended across Hardcastle Ave., the first of the week.

Concrete bottoms of several of the settling tanks for the treatment plant have been

poured and all have been excavated.

Work on the lighting program at the Woodburn city-owned baseball park got underway Tuesday preparatory to installing the new lights.
