47,000 Men in November Call

Washington (AP)—The Defense Department Friday asked the Selective Service System to call up 47,000 men in November, for assignment to the Army.

The other services plan no draft calls in November.

The November figure is the same as for October and is based on maintaining approved strength, after allowances have been made for enlistments and re-enlistments.

This brings to a total of 1,107,430 the number of men called up since September, 1950.

Treasury Offers Higher Interest Rates

Washington (AP)—The treasury announced Friday it will offer on Monday a 14-month treasury note bearing 2 1/2 percent interest per year in exchange for \$10,861,027,000 in outstanding treasury certificates bearing 1 1/2 percent interest.

This was a one-quarter of one percent rise in the interest rate on this issue.

It raised the rate to the highest interest a short term treasury obligation has borne since the depression days of the early thirties.

The issue is to be exchanged matures Oct. 1, 1952. The new notes will be dated that day and will mature Dec. 1, 1953.

Population Doubles
Auckland, N. Z. (AP)—New Zealand's population passed the two million mark this month with the arrival of 588 migrants from Scotland. The population has doubled in the past 44 years.

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Portland Nurse Fund Chairman

Donna Monkman of the state board of nurse examiners in Portland, has accepted the state chairmanship for Oregon of the new national nursing fellowship fund, it was announced yesterday by Mildred Lorentz, national chairman.

The nursing fellowship fund was created last summer at the biennial nursing convention in Atlantic City by and for nurse educators to provide the opportunity for advanced education to qualified nurses who would otherwise not be able to avail themselves of such an educational experience. The country has been divided into six regions and funds raised from each region will revert to that area. The national committee will award as many \$2,000 fellowships as the amount raised will permit. Miss Kathryn T. Burke of the San Francisco college for women is regional chairman for this area, which includes eight key western states.

Beginning the middle of September, 18,000 nurse educators will be asked by mail to contribute to the fund. Candidates will study at the division of nursing education of Teachers college, Columbia university in New York. This will mark the first time that nurses have organized themselves into a national fund raising committee for the advancement of their own professional training, Miss Lorentz said. Since nurses continue to assume greater responsibilities in the care of the sick, there is a growing need for this type of educational opportunity.

Although initially only nurse educators will be solicited, voluntary contributions from all are welcome. Headquarters for the nursing fellowship fund are at 625 West 120 St., New York, 27.

Plenty of Cars For Grain Crop

Seattle (AP)—President Robert S. MacFarlane of the Northern Pacific railway said Thursday his line should be able to meet the peak demands for movement of grain crops in its territory, despite a severe setback in its car-building program.

He said a group of 21 of the line's top officials, including 10 other directors, arrived here Wednesday on a 4,000-mile tour of the railroad's facilities.

He said crops were generally "from good to excellent" throughout the area except in North Dakota and Eastern Montana, where a shortage of rain has caused heavy losses in grain crops.

U.S. Bank Again Reports Gains

In its September 5 report to the comptroller of the currency, the United States National Bank of Portland registered a gain of \$46,234,614.73 over the corresponding report of October 10, 1951.

The total figure for deposits of \$618,313,010.03 marks an all-time high for this Oregon owned and operated institution, according to D. W. Eyre, vice president.

At the same time, deposits of \$47,228,577 were reported for the Ladd & Bush and West Salem branches, Eyre stated.

Loans and discounts of \$219,446,113.50 also reached an all-time high in the United States.

German Expellees Cause Major European Problem

Mount Angel, Ore., Aug. 21 (NC)—The plight of nine million Germans expelled from Poland, East and West Prussia, Silesia, Sudetenland, Hungary and Yugoslavia, following the Potsdam agreement of 1945, is still "the most basic social and religious problem in Western Germany today."

This was the opinion expressed here by the Rev. Alcuin Heibel, O. S. B., president of the Central Europe Relief Committee sponsored by the Benedictine Abbey of Mount Angel. The priest is back from a four-month visit to central Europe to gather clothes and funds for refugees and other needy persons in Germany and Austria.

"This unsatisfactory situation of these 9 million expellees," Father Heibel said, "has been aggravated by the influx of 225,000 non-German political refugees into West Germany and by the recently much-increased stream of German refugees from the Russian zone of Germany."

"Unless these homeless millions are integrated into German society there is going to remain instability and social dissatisfaction, and no government can be too sure of remaining in office."

Father Heibel stressed that if Germany is to be an important part of Europe's defense system against communism, she will have to have more homes and jobs to give shelter and hope to the homeless.

Referring to the danger of communism spread among dissatisfied and hopeless elements,
