Library Tax at Silverton Up

Silverton—Whether or not the Silverton municipal library will be continually aided by a two mill tax of the city property owners will be decided at the Nov. 4 regular election when the local voters will express their preference.

This tax levy would not be in effect until after the new library building is completed which is to be constructed from funds made in individual and group donations, the proposed "Five-Hundred-Dollar clubs" having gone a long way toward insuring the local public the new building.

The civic committee personnel includes Dr. R. E. Killeen, Errol Ross and Rhonin Cooley who are working out plans and contributions for this project.

The two-mill tax would amount to around \$3400 a year which would be needed for heating and maintenance of the proposed new building which is to be located on city property near Silver creek and on ground level.
