TO BUSINESS MEN

Business leaders in Portland City Club carefully studied milk control

This nonpartisan group of over 1,000 citizens, after studying the present Milk Control Law, reported as follows:

"Although considerable argument was presented by various business groups regarding the necessity of continuing price control at the distributor level, the majority of the committee did not find the distribution and sale of

fluid milk sufficiently unlike the marketing of other food products to justify special treatment. We agreed that price regulation in general is contrary to the American free enterprise system and except where required in the public interest would be avoided. We have found insufficient justification for controlling fluid milk prices at the resale level.

"Nor are a majority of us convinced that the removal of controls at the distributor level would result in monopoly detrimental to the consumer, unfair trade practices detrimental to the retail grocer, or a 'chain reaction' downward pressure on prices detrimental to the producer. Fair trade and anti-trust laws are ample protection against the first two feared evils, and adequate administration of producer control will protect his interest from unfair distributor practices."

Food stores say Vote 332 YES

TO FARMERS

Dairymen say Vote 332 YES

Voting 332 YES will protect your milk supply and Oregon dairy farmers. W. A. Johnson, Grants Pass dairyman and President of the Oregon Producer Distributors Association says, "our organization is composed of small dairymen who bottle and distribute their own milk. Under the existing milk control law our numbers have shrunk from 600 to less than 100. Milk Control has consistently lowered the butterfat content of the milk we sell while increasing the price the consumer pays for milk. The new law will assure you of a fair price and give more dairymen an opportunity to contribute to Oregon's supply of Grade A milk."
