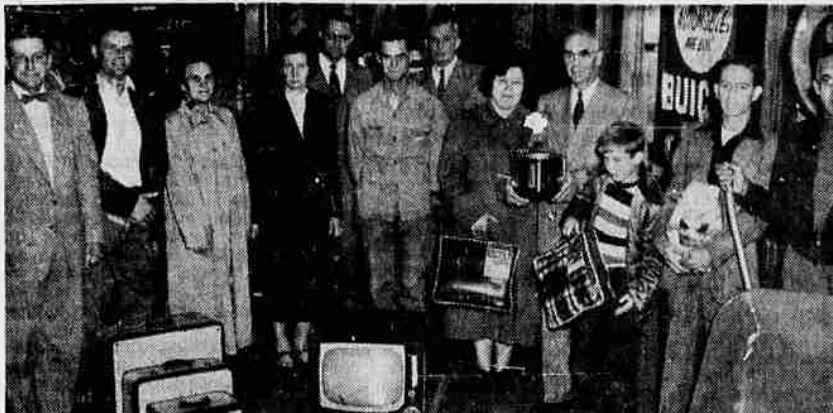

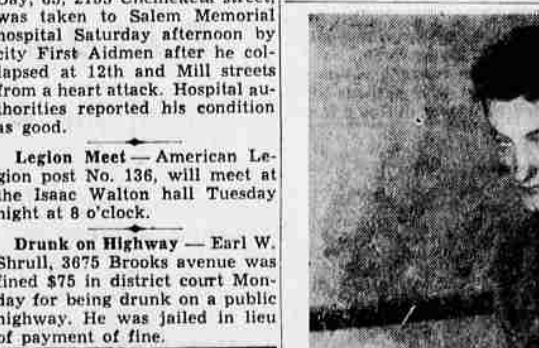

Both the tax commission and the finance department admit the difficulty in "looking into the crystal ball" two years hence and coming up with any figures that could be more than a mere guess.

"Normal changes in the economic base of the general fund could, within a two year period, vary receipts over a considerable range" the statement reads with corresponding effect on either the levy deficiency or the balance in the property reduction account.

The statement said that corporation excise tax collections during the 1953-1955 biennium could range from \$30,000,000 to \$50,000,000 while personal income tax receipts could fall to a low of \$70,000,000 or rise to a high of \$100,000,000.

Oil Progress Told Chamber

The oil industry does not need government help and it hopes to continue under the free enterprise system, declared Gene Connell, vice chairman of the Oregon oil industry information committee during a talk before the chamber of commerce Monday noon.

Connell, brought here in connection with "Oil Progress Week," stated that it was a part of the program to acquaint the general public regarding the facts of the industry. A survey, he said, revealed that the oil industry had been taking for granted that the public knew many facts of which they were ignorant.

Connell said that the fuel being used by jet planes was the finest that is produced in the entire world. In this connection, he said that the oil companies were filling storage space in those places where it would be vitally needed in case of an all out war. He added, however, that this was not an indication that the oil industry believes a global struggle is in the offing. "We don't want to be caught short," he explained.

2 Spies to Die

Mrs. Rosenberg's brother, David Greenglass, testified for the government and helped send his sister and brother-in-law to the death house. Greenglass got a 15-year sentence for his confessed part in the spy plot. No appeal was filed in his case.

The death sentence given the Rosenbergs has been described as the first ever imposed in peace time by a civilian court in this country for espionage.

Judge Irving R. Kaufman in passing sentence in the U. S. District Court in New York City told the Rosenbergs their crime was worse than murder. He said: "I believe that your conduct in putting into the hands of the Russians the A-bomb before our best scientists predicted Russia would perfect the bomb has already caused the communist aggression in Korea, with resultant casualties exceeding 50,000 Americans. And who knows but what millions more of innocent people may pay the price of your treason."

Waives Hearing—Thomas J. Blythe waived preliminary hearing in district court Monday on a charge of non-support. He was jailed in lieu of \$500 bail.

Origin of Early Oregon Press Remains Mystery—Little hand press, probably dating back to pioneer times and recovered from debris when the former Clackamas county courthouse was razed goes back into usage with Rev. Forrest Forbes who conducts Damascus Road Press.

Early-Day Press Used by Pastor on Damascus Road

An old and crudely constructed hand printing press that may well date back to early pioneer times has been recovered from debris in the basement of the former Clackamas county courthouse at Oregon City and is now in use by Rev. Forrest Forbes of Boring.

Forbes, community pastor, and brother to Mike Forbes, Capital Journal valley editor, has drawn upon the Bible for a name becoming his enterprise, and calls his small printery "Damascus Road Press," which is no misnomer since he lives on the road to that community.

T. L. Charman, late president of the Oregon Pioneer society, recovered the small press with its 11 by 20 inch bed from the razed courthouse and attempted to associate it with early newspapers published at Oregon City. Its construction, however, did not fit dimensions of the Free Press started by George L. Curry in 1848. Nor did later research reveal its identity.

One school of thought believes that Clackamas county had an economy wave during the early years of its existence and acquired the little press for the publication of district notices. No date or suggestion about its maker appears on the press. But the frame, obviously, was forged by a blacksmith and the platen and bed are constructed of very old fire wood. Where the screw came from is anyone's guess.

Glen Keller of Sandy, who owned the machine before passing it along to Rev. Mr. Forbes, made a diligent effort to discover its origin but was no more successful than former owners.

Winds in the interior will gradually swing from north to northwest to east Monday and will be of from eight to 18 miles per hour except in the Columbia Gorge, where by evening they will be 20 to 30 miles per hour and 30 to 40 miles per hour Tuesday. West of the Coast range winds will be north and northwest and from 10 to 20 miles per hour.

Lowest humidity forecast for the interior Monday was from 35 to 40 per cent, except in the driest sections of the Cascade area and the east side of Mt. Hood, where the low will be near 25 per cent. Lowest humidity for the interior Tuesday will be 25 to 35 per cent and west of the Coast range the humidity will be above 40 per cent both Monday and Tuesday.

Fair Monday and Tuesday, except for patches of morning fog in the interior and considerable fog and low clouds on the coastal strip is the weather forecast for southwest Oregon.

There will be little change in temperature and humidity will be five per cent lower Tuesday in the interior. The interior winds will become northeasterly Tuesday and west of the Coast range they will be north and northwest both days.

South Central Oregon's forecast is fair for both days and little change in temperature or humidity.
