Fluffy Lemon Bread Pudding

Ingredients: 1 cup water, 6 tablespoons bottled lemon juice, 1/2 cup butter or margarine, 1 cup sugar, 2 eggs (separated), 2 cups soft bread crumbs.			
Method: Mix water and lemon juice. Cream butter and 1/2 cup of the sugar in a mixing bowl; beat in egg yolks one at a time. Stir in water-lemon mixture and bread crumbs. Turn into buttered 1-quart baking dish; place in pan of hot water and bake in moderate (350 degrees F.) oven 30 to 35 minutes or until firm. Beat egg whites until frothy; gradually beat in remaining 1/2 cup sugar until whites are stiff. Spread meringue on baked pudding and continue baking about 15 minutes longer or until meringue is lightly browned. Makes 4 to 6 servings.
