Defense Head Suddenly Ill

Jack A. Hayes, state director of civil defense, was reported in "fair condition" after collapsing Sunday at his home from a heart attack.

Hayes was working in his garden at his home, 2045 Virginia street, when he suffered the attack. He was able to get into his house before he collapsed. He had two more serious attacks after he was brought to Salem General hospital. He was reported as having spent a "fairly comfortable night" at the hospital.

Hayes, who is on the staff of the fire marshal's office, has been civil defense director since 1951. In the World War II period he served first as head of the protection division of civil defense and later was named by the late Governor Earl Snell as acting director.

Associates in Hayes' office said that he had been working at an intense pace for the last few months, but apparently had not suffered from heart trouble before he was stricken Sunday.

As vice chairman of the Far West Association of State Civil Defense Directors, Hayes is scheduled to attend a meeting of the association next week in Phoenix, Ariz.

Navy Plane Crash Kills Five, 1 Injured

New Orleans (AP) — A navy plane bringing Marine reservists here for week-end training crashed into a canal and killed five occupants. A sixth reservist was injured.

Billy Rose Must Reveal Income

New York (AP) — A State Supreme Court justice has told showman Billy Rose to concede his ability to pay unlimited alimony to his estranged wife, Eleanor Holm, or else reveal certain data about his finances since 1939.

The ruling by Justice James B. McNally Friday was a vital point in the former Olympic swimming star's efforts to get a peek at the financial background of her husband.

McNally said Rose must disclose his income, earnings and assets.

Rose, who has kept his wealth secret, reputedly has amassed millions in the 13 years since he married Miss Holm.

They were recently separated, but alimony has yet to be set.

Examination of Rose's records was scheduled for next Wednesday. An alimony hearing set for the same day was postponed.

McNally said that if Rose concedes ability to pay the court will examine the standard of living of the two in setting alimony. Miss Holm now gets \$700 a week temporary alimony.

Harvest May Be Second Largest

Washington (AP) — The Agriculture Department expects this year's harvest to be the second largest on record.

The department Friday revised its Sept. 1 estimate upward nearly 2 per cent, making it only 3 per cent below peak production in 1948. It said conditions were better for most of the major late-growing crops.

Forecasts included: 3,256,550,000 bushels of corn, 1,298,921,000 bushels of wheat and 345,000 bushels of soybeans.

Moscow Pictures American Farmers in Destitute Shape

Washington (AP) — Most American farmers, says Moscow, are "living a wretched and semi-starved existence."

This report was given by the Moscow radio to the Russians in the latest of a series of broadcasts on the Communist version of the American way of life.

Moscow's report of farm life in the U. S. was reported today by U. S. government monitors.

The report started out by saying "American propaganda spreads lies about the high standard of living among the American farmers, and deliberately gives false statistics on average income rates to try to hide the real condition of the bulk of the American farmers who are living a wretched and semi-starved existence."

"As the result of the constant enrichment of bigger companies and the ruin of small farmers, in the period from 1935 to 1950 alone, 1½ million small farmers and land tenants were forced to leave their land," the Russians were told.

"The housing conditions of farmers are also despicable. They live in ramshackle dwellings, sometimes even without roofs."

Quoting from what it described as an official American report, Moscow said that in the south, millions have been forced to leave the land because of farm mechanization.

There was no mention of Russia's own ambitious farm mechanization program, believed to be behind schedule.

Iran Protest Strike Ends

Tehran, Iran (AP) — Several thousand operating and maintenance workers of Iran's state-owned railways returned to work yesterday after a 24-hour protest strike against nonpayment of salary increases promised seven months ago.

There was no indication that the wage boosts would be forthcoming immediately. The Tehran station director said the government was unable to pay them.

Meanwhile, Iran's new foreign minister, former Deputy Prime Minister Hossein Fatemi, told a news conference that top Iranian diplomats would be assigned to Asian and neighboring countries in the future instead of Western nations.

Financial, Commodity Markets Closed Today

New York (AP) — Financial and commodity markets throughout the United States closed Monday in observance of Columbus day which fell on Sunday. However, some livestock reports were issued as usual by the department of agriculture.

Canadian stock and grain exchanges were also closed, celebrating their Thanksgiving day.

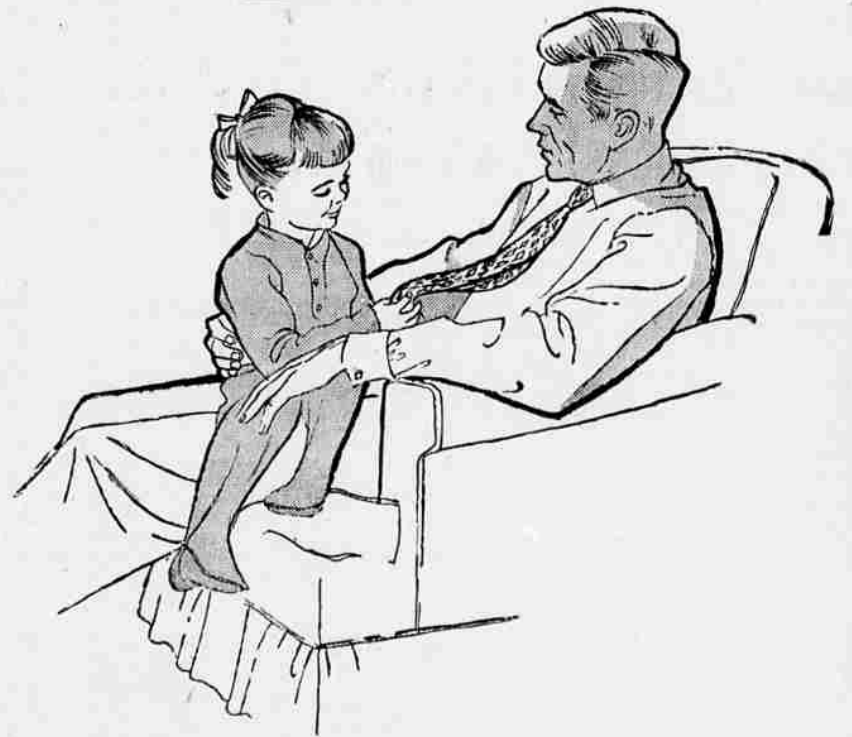
