

Coyotes Score in Last 38 Seconds to Win 7-6

A placekicked point after touchdown, which barely cleared the crossbar at the north end of McCulloch stadium, provided College of Idaho with a 7-6 victory over Willamette university in the Beavers' Northwest conference opener before 3000 fans Saturday night.

Dick Turner, a substitute quarterback, thumped the vital extra point with just 38 seconds remaining in the ball game.

The ultra-important conversion put a dramatic climax to a contest that saw several scoring threats by each team, but only one touchdown apiece.

The first half ended 0-0. Willamette got inside the C of I 30 yard line twice during the fumbles twice on lost possessions on downs once.

College of Idaho's deepest invasion of Willamette territory in

the first half carried to the 16 yard line. From there, the Coyotes were pushed back to the 26, where they relinquished the ball on downs.

Ed Bonaminio, C of I halfback, uncorked the longest run of the game, a 40-yard gallop to the Willamette 18 yard line, just before the halftime gun. The gun didn't necessarily halt a would-be scoring attack that time, though, because Bonaminio fumbled on the play anyway, Willamette recovering.

Willamette finally put together a touchdown drive in the third period.

It all started when one of Turner's punts was deflected by Hal Hargreaves, a Willamette tackle, and fell short on the Bearcat 44 yard line. With Benny Holt passing and Louis Lofland and Chuck Lewis running, coach Ted Ogdahl's club marched straight to a touchdown. Lewis went the last yard by cutting sharply inside his right tackle. John Kent's placekick was wide.

College of Idaho took the kick-off, and drove as far as the Willamette 18, finally losing the ball on downs at that point.

Early in the fourth quarter, the Coyotes lost the ball on downs after getting as close as the Willamette 30.

A few minutes later, College of Idaho was rolling again. This time an intercepted pass by Willamette's Denny Elsasser stopped the threat.

The game-deciding touchdown came about thusly:

College of Idaho took a short punt and started on the Willamette 46. Three plays failed to gain. With fourth down and ten yards to go, George Pesut gambled by tossing a pass to R. C. Owens. The gamble paid off as the play went for 21 yards, carrying to the 25 yard line.

Three plays later the visitors had a first down on the Willamette 13. Two plays gained three yards. Then Boyd Crawford faked back to pass, saw his potential receivers all covered, so lit out and ran with the ball—all the way to the five yard line.

Ted Martin circled end to the one foot line, where it was first down.

On the next play, Martin hammered through tackle for the big foot. That tied the score 6-6 with 38 seconds left to play. Turner's educated toe did the rest.

Giants Move Into Driver's Seat in National Pro Loop

New York (AP)—The New York Giants, who have taken a back seat to the Cleveland Browns for the past two seasons, kicked themselves into the driver's seat Monday in the National Football League's American Conference with a 17-9 triumph over the Midwest powerhouse.

While New York made its record 3-0 at the expense of the conference champions, the San Francisco Forty-Niners remained the league's only other perfect-record team by making the Detroit Lions their third straight victim, 28-0, as the pros reeled off six games Sunday.

In the other contests, the defending champion Los Angeles Rams came from behind with 24 last-period points to edge Green Bay, 30-28; the Chicago Bears downed Dallas, 38-20, and the Chicago Cardinals beat Washington, 17-6.

Brown's contract was extended to eight years when he signed a new five-year pact Saturday but he managed only a faint grin as he blamed Cleveland's defeat on "a couple of errors and a better club." The defeat dropped Cleveland into three-way tie for second with the Eagles and Cards.

Brown said the big "error" was the pass which Charlie Conerly completed to Bob Wilkinson for a 70-yard touchdown with only 14 seconds to go in the first half. "But they've got a nice ball club and they were just too much for us yesterday."

It was the New York defense, a burly, relentless crew headed by tackles Arnie Weinmeister and Al Derogatis, guards Jon Baker and Bill Albright and linebacker John Cannady—that humbled the proud Browns before a crowd of 51,858.

Lou Groza's three field goals, one a 52-yarder, gave Cleveland a 9-7 lead going into the final quarter. But Ray Poole's 25-yard field goal early in the fourth

period put New York ahead to stay, 10-9.

Less than 60 seconds later Otto Graham got off a hurried pass against the rushing Giant defense. Halfback Tom Landry intercepted it on the Brown 30 and ran for the touchdown that insured the New York victory.

Bill Wilson, Hugh McElhenny, Frankie Albert and Don Burke scored San Francisco's touchdowns as the Forty-Niners held Detroit to four first downs.

Green Bay led Los Angeles, 26-6, after three periods but two touchdowns by Dan Towler, one by Bob Carey and Bob Waterfield's 22-yard field goal gave the Rams their first 1952 victory.

End Bob Walston kicked four field goals, two coming in the last two minutes, to lead Philadelphia to victory over Pittsburgh.

The Bears won easily against Dallas at Wrigley Field as quarterback Bob Williams threw two touchdowns passes to Gene Schroeder and an one to Chuck Hunsinger while completing 13 out of 15 tosses.

NCAA to Talk Over TV, Other Policy Plans

Chicago (AP)—With a recent Notre Dame blast at collegiate television policies still resounding, two committees of the NCAA met today to work over TV and other plans for the future.

A four-day general policy going-over was in prospect. Besides the television problem, the committees planned to take up such things as post-season competition and alleged non-observance of NCAA rules by at least three of its members.

Names of the schools involved in the reported infractions have not been made public.

The committees on hand are the NCAA Executive Committee and the NCAA Council. The overall purpose of the meetings is to shape various reports for final action by the NCAA Convention in January.

Notre Dame spokesmen say they have learned a "share the wealth" TV program is being prepared by NCAA bodies. They say the plan would split money received in the association's controlled video program among all members.

Edward (Moose) Krause, Irish athletic director, condemned over the week-end any such move as "immoral, illegal, un-American and socialist." He asked why, "on the same basis, shouldn't endowments and state legislative funds for colleges be split among all the schools?"

Portland — Outweighed but not outplayed, Sacred Heart's Cardinals upset the highly favored and rugged Columbia Prep football team, 6-0, here Saturday afternoon.

The Cardinals' six-point game came early in the fourth period, when Vance Cooney carried over from the six-inch line.

It was a see-saw battle during the first half, with most of the

playing done around the mid-field stripe. Neither team could get a good drive going, as both teams displayed a stubborn defense.

In the third period, it seemed as if the game was going to end in a 0-0 deadlock. But with a minute and a half left in that stanza, a 15-yard penalty against the Crusaders put the ball on their own 17 yard line.

A Columbia Prep punt was blocked by Jimmy Fischer, who broke through from his defensive line-backer position. Fischer jumped on the ball on the Portlanders' six yard line.

Bill Thompson carried the ball on the next play to the two, but there the strong Prep line held tight and Coach Leo Grosjacques' gang was forced to give the ball up on downs. There the third period ended.

Columbia Prep took over, but two plays later Charles Lauer, the CP quarterback, fumbled. Jim Borsberry, who played himself a whale of a ball game, pounced on the oval, and it was Sacred Heart's ball once again, this time on the CP's eight yard line.

On the next play Cooney handed to Fischer, and it looked like the powerful fullback from Salem went over, but the

referee put the ball on the six inch line, where Cooney, on the next play, sneaked over for the only touchdown of the game.

The point after TD attempt, by Fischer, was no good.

The Rose City lads still had six minutes in which to score, and they tried their best, but all in vain, for along with Jim Borsberry, Al Luke, Stan Dvork and Bob Stevens, who played a terrific defensive game for Sacred Heart, the big green-clad Crusaders could not get their offensive to go.

Coach Grosjacques, who had no depth in reserves, was unable to do much substituting, but every boy who was in the game received praise from his coach.
