Smoked Pork Shoulder Butt With Hot Peaches

Ingredients: One 2 to 2½ pound boneless smoked pork shoulder butt, whole cloves, ¼ cup honey, one No. 2½ can ciling peach halves, butter or margarine.

Method: Cover shoulder butt with water and bring to boil; simmer about ¾ hour for each pound. Place on shallow baking pan (lined with aluminum foil if desired). Stick butt with cloves about 1 inch apart. Pour honey over butt. Drain peach halves thoroughly and place cavity side up around butt. Put about ¼ teaspoon butter in each peach cavity. Bake in very hot (450°F) oven, basting butt once, until lightly browned and peaches are heated through—about 10 minutes. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

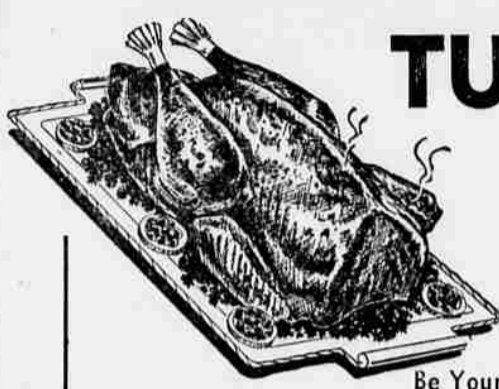
